6th Annual UPPER WILLIAMSON Outing - April 30 to May 3, 2014

Sixth Annual RFF Outing to Upper Williamson River begins Wednesday, April 30 at the US Forest Service "Head of the River" Campground at 10:00 am. Folks with cars, trucks, campers, trailers or RVs will caravan about 9 miles north (down river) on Forest Service Road 4648 to a junction with Forest Service Road 440 where we turn west about 0.7 mile to our camp area on the river. The 440 Road is a narrow, deeply rutted, pumice surface track through a lodgepole pine forest. We should arrive there about 11:00 am. Stay 1, 2, 3, or 4 days; 2-weeks is max, I think, whatever works for you.



This spring-fed river threads oxbows and meanders thru gentle meadows fringed by lodge poles and willows. Big rainbows and brownies with fine dry fly and excellent nymphing opportunities; mostly floating line on 3, 4, or 5-weight rods. The photo, looking down-stream from camp, shows Upper Williamson is a cold spring creek walk/wade fishery through open meadows. Fishing from any floating device like float tube, pontoon or boat or is not allowed. May is a good time to try peach or tan PMDs that John Hyde and Bob Quigley favor, and we may hit an early Black Drake hatch near dusk. John Hyde likes Wooly Buggers with a Prince Nymph dropper at undercut banks or deep holes. Be careful if you wade fish due to really soft deep holes.

If you are staying here overnight, come prepared. It's rustic: no toilets, no drinking water, no cell phones, and there may be rain showers. Elk hunters have left some rough board counters and rocks for a fire hole but we'll have to cut and haul firewood. Gary Graham and John Ward will be camping here Tuesday thru Saturday. We will lead folks back to their rigs at **Head of the River Campground** before dark where there are six developed camp sites with tables, fire rings, toilets, and probably cut firewood to split; we will come get you next morning. Ward will be trying Dutch Oven dinners so bring your pots and ovens and join the fun and friendship, and share recipes.

North Umpqua Outing

On April 5, David Haight will lead an outing to the North Umpqua River to fish for its wild winter steelhead. The North Umpqua is famous among fly fishers for its summer steelhead fishery, but it is a great destination for winter steelhead too. It is a beautiful river, and its steelhead tend to be larger and more challenging than those on the Rogue.

We will meet at Swiftwater Park (just a little below Rock Creek and the lower boundary of the fly water) at 9:00 AM. After a brief discussion about the river and how to fish it, we will tour access points and fishing holes in the lower half of the fly water. We will then spread out along the river to fish. At that time, I will be happy to help anyone looking for additional instruction about fishing the North Umpqua or about steelhead fishing in general.

During the winter season, Spey rods can be an asset on the North Umpqua, but single-handed rods of about 8-weight will also work. Sink -tip lines or shooting heads will help you get your flies down to the fish. A wide variety of flies will work--from the traditional steelhead patterns to large intruder-style flies. The North Umpqua can be difficult to wade, so bring your waders, wading boots with good traction, wading belt, and wading staff. If you have one, an inflatable PFD will add an extra level of safety. Be sure to pack your rain jacket, polarized glasses, sun screen, food, water, and the rest of your normal fishing accessories.

Unfortunately, most of the Forest Service and BLM campgrounds will still be closed for the season. The Dogwood Motel (dogwoodmotel.com, 541-496-3403), located near the lower end of the fly water, is a decent place to stay at a reasonable price.

The Steamboat Inn (thesteamboatinn.com, 800-840-8825) is a great place to stay, if it fits your budget, and it overlooks some of the best water on the river. There are also numerous lodging and dining options in Roseburg.

Summer Casting

Beginning May 4, we will gather to cast on Monday evenings from 6:00 to 7:00P.M. at Hedrick Middle School on East Jackson in Medford. Otis Swisher, Tom Collett, and John MacDiarmid look forward to casting with you and giving you pointers to improve your casting if you like. If you just want to "warm up" and tighten up your loops before the season starts, then come on out. If you are wondering what tightening up your loops means, then you definitely would benefit from some time with the casting instructors. If you are having trouble with a particular cast or casting situation, we may be able to help. As always we really enjoy starting beginners correctly. In addition to beginners and open casting every session, we are also going to have specific lessons on specific cast. The fist specific classes will be on May 18 & 25 and deal with improving your accuracy. First off, how close do you have to be to a trout to present the fly? Can you drop it in a 2' circle at that distance? Working on our fishing and casting instruction training, we can help you with that. Subsequent classes will deal with cross body casting, slack line casting, the double haul and distance.

An Introduction To The Art, Science and Joy of Fly Fishing

In this one day class for beginners and novices you will learn everything you need to get started fishing the Rogue for steel head and trout. The class will cover wadding equipment, rods, reels, lines, leaders and f lies. Basic knots will be taught and there will be a section on entomology, aquatic insects, and the flies that imitate them. The final lesson will be on presenting the fly and casting. If you have a rod, reel and line, bring it but do not go out and buy one for the class. We will cover what rod to buy in the class. The club has rods for the class, let the instructor know if you will need one. Each year in late May and early June a large stone fly hatch occurs in the upper Rogue River above Shady Cove. The class will cover how to fish this hatch. We will also pick an evening to visit the "Holy Water" and cast our stone flies over feeding rainbows.

You must be a current member of the Rogue Flyfishers to take this class. There will be a \$10 charge to cover the cost of a small book, The Curtis Creek Manifesto.

The class will be held on May 3 from 9 to 3:30 at the club house for the Madrone Hill Mobile Home Park. The park is located at 8401 Old Stage Road not far from Gold Hill. Traveling North on I-5 take Exit 40 at Gold Hill and proceed South on the Old Stage Road towards Jacksonville, the park is well identified on the right.

John MacDiarmid an FFF Certified Casting Instructor is the class instructor. Email him at jmacd@jeffnet.org to register for the class. There will be a limit of 12 students, you must be pre registered to attend. Folks that signed up at the RFF beginning fly tying class are already registered, you will be contacted by John.
