

Snake Bit on the Rogue

This article is for all you river rats that enjoy rowing on the Rogue about as much as you do fishin'. It seems appropriate since in the past few years there have been a number of boating accidents; some humorous, and others tragic. Let me tell you one of mine.

It went something like this: 'Twas August of '02. I call Otis Swisher. "Hey, Otis, would you like to go fishin' this week? We can take my boat." "Yes, Dave, looks like I have Friday available. DIRECTIONS: Take Gold Hill Exit #40, off of I-5 and go west, toward Jacksonville, 1.3 miles, until you reach the brick entrance way to the Madrone Hill Mobile Home Park on the right. You'll pass a golf course parking lot on your left shortly after leaving the freeway. After you turn right into the mobile home park, proceed to the community building which is located about 100 yards ahead on the left. The address is 8401 Old Stage Rd. Please park your vehicle on the bare dirt in the parking lot to avoid the wooden septic covers in the grass

PATTERN OF THE MONTH - Winter Purple

Hook: Daiichi 2441, traditional salmon/steelhead, size 4-8.

Thread: 6-0 red.

Flat silver tinsel. Tag: Purple marabou fibers. Tail: Body: Purple floss or flex floss.

Flat silver tinsel. Rib:

4 or 5 strands of pearl Krystal Flash. Underwing:

Purple saddle. Hackle:

Purple marabou plume. Wing 1-3:

Collar: Purple saddle.



Tying Instructions-

- Step 1 Mash the barb and mount the hook in the vise.
- Step 2: Start the thread one eye width behind the eye and lay down an even thread base to a position 1/8" forward of the hook point...
- Step 3: Cut a piece of flat silver tinsel about 6" long and tie it in above the hanging thread leaving 2" tag extending toward the bend and 4" extending toward the eye. Wind the rear 2" tag toward the rear 1/8" and back toward the eye the same amount. Tie off and trim.
- Step 4: Select a small bunch of purple marabou plumes, measure to just past the end of the hook, and tie on at the base of the tag. Tie down the butts along the top of the hook shank to behind the eye. Tie off and trim.
- Step 5: Tie in the floss at the original tie-in point behind the eye and lay it along the hook shank, tying it down to the base of the tag. Return the thread to a point two eye widths behind the eye.
- Step 6: Wind the floss forward in touching turns to the position of the hanging thread. Tie off and trim.
- Step 7: Now wind the flat tinsel forward in 5 equal turns to the hanging thread. Tie off and trim.
- Step 8: Select 4 or 5 strand of pearl Krystal Flash, measure length to the bend of the hook, tie on and trim.
- Step 9 Select a purple saddle hackle with barbs long enough to reach the point. Prepare the feather and tie it on by the tip. Wind forward 3 turns, tie off and trim.
- Step 10: Select a small bunch of purple marabou with fibers long enough to reach the end of the hook. Tie on at the base of the hackle and trim butts. Select another small bunch of marabou with fibers shorter than the first. Tie off and trim. Repeat with a third bunch shorter than the second. Tie off and trim
- Step 11: Select another purple hackle, prepare, tie on, and wind forward 3 turns. Tie off and trim
- Step 12: Tie back on the hackle barbs until collar is at a 45 degree angle to the hook shank. Form an neat tapered head, whip finish and cement.

This month's pattern, the Winter Purple, was originated by Trey Combs as part of a series for winter Steelhead fishing. It was designed to sink well in deep pools, attract well in soft currents, but swim upright, without turning over in heavy tail-outs. It is tied with a slim body, sparse materials and just the right amount of flash.

Tying Tips:

The most difficult step in assembling this fly is the three-part wing. The secret is to leave plenty of room behind the eye for the hackle, wings, and collar and to keep materials sparse. The extra room allows each component to be tied in front of the last, decreasing the bulk. Keep thread wraps to a minimum 2-3 wraps should be sufficient and trim close. Wrapping back on the collar covers the wing tie-in thread wraps. Don't let the number of steps keep you from trying this pattern. It is not that difficult and the materials are common. So tie some up, give them a test flight and let me know how you do.

Love my teachers

I really liked school as a youngster growing up. My auto shop instructor was just a fantastic person. I not only learned how fix and repair my car, but I also learned about sharing one's knowledge and passing it on. I still get calls from my kids, "Dad, my car is making a noise, why do my brakes squeal?"

My father once told me: "not sharing your knowledge is an unforgivable act of selfishness". I lost my fishing partner and father about 13 yrs ago; he was great at sharing his experiences and knowledge.

I started coaching jr. high and high school football, basketball, and baseball when I was in my mid 20's. I was a football player and very much wanted to play in college. As fate would have it I broke my leg my freshman year and after surgery, wasn't able to play any longer. My girlfriend (now wife of 36 yrs) thought I was starting to waste a way and convinced me that I could help kids develop their skills in sports, since I couldn't play any longer. She is pretty good at figuring things out like that. I had coached almost 26 years and loved sharing talents with the youth. Now I fish as much as I can. I love it!!!

We moved to So. Oregon in the fall of 2004. I started fishing the Rogue the following year. I had not a clue how to fish for Steelhead. I tried lots of things with my 8wt fly rod. Nothing seemed to work. I didn't have anyone to turn to, not a soul. Want to know how frustrating it was to not know even a little bit about what I was trying to accomplish? Just ask me when you have a moment or 30.

Then I met a Mark, a really good fishing friend still today. He took me under his wing and showed, explained, and mentored me into my first steelhead. He was there with me and helped land my first one and now we even compete on a larger scale. The next year I met a gentleman who belonged to a fly fishing club. He talked me into coming to a meeting at the Red Lion Inn. Low and behold it was a RFF club meeting. I will admit I was a little uncomfortable at first when I arrived. He wasn't there like he said he'd be and to be quite up front, I haven't seen him ever again.

After only 10 or 15 minutes and a beer, I had met Otis, Lee, and Kellie. I sat at a table and shared a little bit, but mostly listened. What a knowledge base of info I was getting. I wished I'd had a tape recorder. Everyone seemed to know a lot and like my father, they wanted to share. I was so impressed that night and told Pam that I wanted to join the club. I have loved every moment I've spent listening, practicing, and even sharing myself with some of you. What a gift we have to share. What a shame if we don't use our knowledge to the benefit of others. Some of you have been teachers to me, Rich, Lee, John, Morris, Brad, and Otis; this list can go lots farther. Life is too short not to share what you know and love.

What drew me here to this wonderful club is the camaraderie, sharing, friendship, and caring for what we love. That is why I really want all of our members to consider helping with our new Mentoring program. Everyone who stood up at the January meeting knows how it feels to help others, to learn from others, and then reflect on how meaningful it is to share.

I don't have lots of experience or knowledge, but I really want to know more, do more and help others as much as I can. I LOVE FISHING!!!!!! I am always looking for new friends to share my passion with. I also want to learn more and more, so I can help others more.

Fly Fishing, an acquired skill

Fly fishing, like a very large jig-saw puzzle, consists of many small pieces. When un-assembled, it appears to be just a disorganized jumble; but, when put together, becomes a thing of beauty. A piece of art.

I hope you Rogue Fly Fishers will participate in this series of brief articles. From your experience, reach into your acquired bag of skills. Pull one out. Write about it. Share with others this small part of your Fly Fishing success.

Or, if you are stymied, frustrated, long suffering, over a "problem", ask about it so someone who has found a solution to that aggravating problem can share his "How I solved that conundrum."

It may be something to do with "the cast", or "fly presentation", or "indicators", or "swinging the fly", or "setting the hook", or "wading safety" or Just name it. Let someone respond. We'll all benefit, along with you who respond because you took time to write your short article.

To get the ball rolling, here is a suggested topic:

Using the Wind to Your Advantage When Casting by Otis D. Swisher

I like to have the wind blowing against my left shoulder, when possible. This is my off- rod hand as I am a "rightie". The line is thus kept out and away from my body on my right. No chance to get the hook driven into my clothes, or worse still, any body parts.

I find that the extension of line on the back cast is aided by the wind. And, of course the final forward cast is blown out to its fullest extension as well.

So Many Fish, So Little Time - February

Fishing has been difficult with over 5.000 c.f.s. coming out of the dam and the tributaries high as well. Two good ways to obtain current information on river flow are 1) phone 1-800-472-2434, listen to the recorded message, and 2) on your computer use Google, type in Rogue Basin Teacup, and move the pointer to Lost Creek Lake or other site on the river for which you need information. Also, other Oregon rivers monitored by the Corps of Engineers can be checked by scrolling elsewhere in the state starting from Rogue Basin Teacup. In general, fishing the upper Rogue improves with lower flows, the lower the better, and anything over about 3,000 to 3,500 c.f.s. is reason to look elsewhere unless you fish with Otis Swisher. That said, look for flows to decline as winter storms subside and the Corps begins holding water back to fill Lost Creek Lake. We can hope for a good run of winter steelhead this year. The fish were running significantly bigger before conditions deteriorated a few weeks ago, and we look for some real trophies being caught as the river becomes fishable.
