(This is a letter read to the general membership at the December dinner meeting:)



Hi, my name is Dorothy and I am a Breast Cancer survivor, since January 2013. Kind of sounds like an AA meeting. But I am also a: mother, grandmother, sister, daughter, aunt, friend, gardener, bowler, reader, and thanks to the Casting for Recovery organization, I am learning how to fly fish. I can't tell how excited I was to get the notice from the Casting for Recovery organization that I was randomly selected to attend the Black Butte Ranch retreat this last October 17-19th. I submitted my applications for the 2013 retreats in Elkton (September) and Black Butte (October) and was not chosen. This year I was one of the lucky ones! Only 14 participants are chosen for each retreat. And that leaves a lot of disappointed applicants. But there is always next year, we hope.

The weekend starts when you arrive at the Black Butte Ranch and check in with the Casting for Recovery Staff and Volunteers. We get room assignments, introductions, and an Overview of the Program. We give info for our fishing license, and then we try on the waders and boots. That was exiting. We had a full schedule for the weekend retreat. The weekend involved: Intro to Fly-Fishing and knot-tying, a presentation of what Fish eat, Casting demo and Instruction and practice time on the lawn, group discussions for the physical effects of Breast Cancer and another group discussion of the emotional effects of Breast Cancer. And there were goodies for us at almost every meeting or meal that included: blanket (for the campfire we had the Friday evening), containers of flies, sunscreen, flashlight, scarfs, and lots more. We were treated like royalty and very pampered.

On Sunday we are introduced to our personal River Helper (or Pond Guide in our case). We had breakfast and got to know them; then we gear up and head out for our day of guided Catch and Release Fly-Fishing. And that's what it is all about. Well, not so fast, before we head out there are lots of pictures. Once we walk to our place on the pond, we try to put into practice all that we have been taught. Practice, practice, practice.

It was one of the most beautiful weekends I have had. Early in the mornings, there were photo clubs taking pictures of the pond and the water was like glass. The weather was absolutely perfect: around 70, some clouds, calm waters, no bugs. Being out in the middle of nature at its best, it was breath-taking.

So, why am I here tonight? It is an opportunity to thank some of the very people who are responsible for me to participate in the weekend and this wonderful organization. I am truly grateful. WHAT YOUR CLUB DID WITH CONSERVATION FUNDS FOR 2014 THIS MONEY WAS RAISED BY OUR ANNUAL AUC-TION AND STEELHEAD TOURNAMENT

(Hopefully this will inspire and encourage everyone to continue to contribute to our fundraisers.)

<u>January—\$1,800 toward Evans Creek Dam Removal</u>— There are two dams, the Fielder and Weimer, which are the last two impeding dams for migrating fish. Removal of these dams will ad 40 miles of access to migrating Coho and Steelhead. This was paid for with the proceeds from the 2013 Steelhead tournament.

<u>February—\$250 to Rogue River keeper</u>-Provided educational, informative materials, including maps to property owners directly impacted by the proposed LNG pipeline. These land owners became a crucial part of our NO LNG movement population.

<u>February</u>—\$1,000 to Bear Creek Watershed —The subsurface of the creek, located near the ball fields off 99 in Phoenix/Medford is uneven and the water temperature has been an issue. The money we donated paid for test holes which uncovered the fact that a buried sewer line adjacent to the creek is raising water temperatures to an unhealthy level. Once this was discovered, a new way to bring in cooling water was created. Because of our test holes, the Watershed now has a solution to this problem and the necessary documentation to secure grant funding to accomplish this critical habitat improvement.

April \$1,575 for OSU scholarship

<u>July—\$1,850 to Water Watch</u> for Gold Hill Irrigation District cleanup-The area addressed in this project consisted of an open channel (glorified ditch) which was home to predatory fish and resulting in the demise of the fish we are trying to protect. Our donation helped install a new head gate, with screen, protecting the migrating fish and improving their passages and spawning capabilities.

<u>July—\$500 to Rick Hafele</u> to critique the city of Medford's outflow study-The outfall study, which was quite lengthy and technical, needed to be condensed into bullet points in order to succeed in our quest to address and correct the hot water and loss of critical habitat that the treatment plant has created. Rick was able to compile such a list and we were successfully able to use this information as ammunition in our fight to restore this failing and necessary habitat.

<u>August—\$500 to Oregon Stewardship</u> to support youth and conservation—An annual donation to Jim Hutchins and his crew who clean up and maintain critical habitat on Bear Creek.

<u>September—\$500 CRAG Law Center</u> toward study of the effect of the water quality of the proposed LNG Pipeline. We cannot fight and win without the legal folks whose expertise is in dealing with these critical and life changing environmental issues.

<u>December—\$2,250 to Stream Restoration project</u>, consisting of the \$1585 balance from the Reed Ryan Conservation Fund plus \$665 of club funds—This money went for removal of an unexpected dam, associated with Pacific Power, on Jones Creek in Grants Pass. This stream restoration project included correction of bank contours and the necessary riparian plantings as well.

December—\$500 TO Casting for Recovery and \$500 for Project Healing Waters

TOTAL OF FUNDS DISPERSED FOR 2014—\$9390.00

The money raised from out auction and steelhead tournament goes into the bank and is dispersed very carefully by your Board of Directors after reviewing each project. This is why is it so important that all club members continue to support these events. Give yourselves a pat on the back. None of this would be possible without your support!

Thanks to every person in the club serving on the Board of Directors. It is a great responsibility and we are grateful for the time, effort and dedication of each and every person serving.

Thanks also, to every club member who actively supports conservation efforts throughout the year. There are a lot of people who work without acknowledgement, showing up at public forums to represent our fish and water conservation, preservation and restoration ideals. There are folks who walk and haul and dig and clean all year to keep our waters and habitat healthy.

We should also acknowledge and thank the committee chairs and members, for their dedication and long hours fighting the good fight. Thanks to our esteemed newsletter editor, website gurus, fly tiers etc.

The founding fathers of this club, I'm sure, are proud of the legacy we continue to preserve and improve.

January Outing--Winter Steelhead on the Lower Rogue

Since January is one of the slower times for fishing in our area, we typically head to the coast where fishing for winter steelhead is in full swing. This year, we will head to a river where I don't think we have fished for winter steelhead as a club before--the lower Rogue River near Gold Beach. The lower Rogue is a big river with large gravel bars and long runs well suited to swinging flies with long rods. If you don't have a Spey or switch rod, don't worry, the steelhead usually travel close to shore within easy range of single-handed rods.

On January 17, we will meet for breakfast at 8:00 AM at the Indian Creek Cafe located a short distance upstream of Hwy 101 on the south side of the Rogue (94682 Jerry's Flat Road). If you don't want to eat breakfast, join us there by 9:00 AM.

The lower Rogue River offers plenty of opportunities for both bank and boat anglers. Many of the large gravel bars are publicly owned and easy to get to, giving bank anglers plenty of places to fish. Drift boats, pontoon boats, jet boats, and even prop boats, if you are careful, can be used to access other good locations.

For equipment, seven to eight-weight Spey or switch rods paired with Skagit heads and an assortment of tips would be ideal. Similar weight single-handed rods with sink-tip lines or sinking shooting heads will also work well. Bring 10 to 15-lb tippet material and an assortment of flies--from traditional steelhead patterns, to egg-sucking leeches, to intruders. Black or purple flies with a bit of bright color mixed in often work well. If you prefer to dead-drift egg patterns or nymphs, you can do that too. Pack your wader and rain gear as well.

Gold Beach has a good variety of lodging and dining options, and there are several RV parks and campgrounds along the river. You can find more information at www.goldbeach.org.

There are a variety of other fishing options in the area. If you want to try a smaller stream, Hunter Creek and Pistol River have good runs of winter steelhead. Due to the uncertainty of river conditions during the winter, be sure to check the club's website before you leave for the outing to see if we had to make any last-minute changes.
