#### **President's Message**

I felt that the sport was exclusive to cold water species. It's easy to have this perspective given that the majority of films and magazines seem to show individuals only targeting trout and salmon on the fly. For years, my family has had our family reunion at Lake Powell. Lake Powell is known for its large Striper population. In the summer, one of the ways they feed is to target fresh water shad as they feed on the surface. As hundreds of stripers feed on the surface, it looks like a giant pot of boiling water as the stripers fiercely attack the shad. Its an incredible site, and there's nothing more exciting than throwing a fly in the middle that resembles a shad, and stripping your line in quickly in order to intensify the attack. The take is so incredibly strong and powerful; your adrenaline will take some time to calm. I would have never discovered the joy of Striped Bass fishing had I not decided to explore other opportunities other than trout fishing.
- 4) Tie your own flies. For years I used to tie my own flies, then with the advent of the internet, I realized that I could buy flies for pretty cheap. Almost for about the same, if not cheaper, than tying them. As a result, I ended up buying my flies for years. Until recently, I have started to tie again and have realized that one of the greatest joys of fly fishing is catching fish on your own hand tied flies

# **RFF Outings Schedule for 2016**



## **Our TOP Priority Current Conservation Project is COHO**

RFF is helping develop operational COHO Recovery Plan for Interior Rogue Diversity Strata. Ms. Julie Weeder, COHO Recovery Coordinator for National Marine Fisheries Service spoke on the Final SONCC COHO Salmon Recovery Plan in Central Point, February 17, 2015. RFF Board made COHO Recovery our top Conservation focus; by May 6 Ward had commitments from ten Rogue Team volunteers, by Nov. 10 five more were 'maybe' and the final fifteen Rogue Team are on board Jan. 1, 2016. Still looking for a strong fisher-person who knows the Illinois River.



#### TASKS:

Rogue Team members were first asked to become familiar with NOAA Final Plan definitions, tables, charts & maps, stresses matrix, threats matrix for assigned Chapter, and high intrinsic potential COHO streams GIS maps from Rogue River Watershed Council, courtesy of GEOS Institute. Next, to compare their knowledge of HIP Coho + NOAA data to their own experience. Then many Rogue Team Members met as a group for the **first** time and pooled their knowledge of key COHO abundance in **8** mainstem and **21** tributary streams. Julie Weeder was present to answer questions, clarify the Final Report and note additional data needed.

Rogue Fly Fishers brings 46-years of successful conservation and habitat projects in the Interior Rogue, perhaps the longest group of well documented accomplishments. As shown on next page this history has gaps, needs detail, and definitely needs follow-up monitoring. What worked best? Where? What failed and why? This extensive history needs study, field visits, and reporting. Which of current habitat and conservation projects will really be a winner? We need tight focus from the Rogue Coho Team and RFF Board commitment.

**Interior Rogue plays a key role in recovery success**; Rogue's 3 population types are to produce 28,000 spawners annually. SONCC's 37 other population types are to generate 75,000 spawners. With major barriers removed, active restoration partners and agencies, and strong watershed councils, the **Interior Rogue seems well matched to COHO recovery** needs. A series of **realistic Strategic Action Plans** to protect healthy existing populations, prioritizing and proposing a fundable series of restoration projects with measurable / demonstrable results over the next three to five years, say **by 2020, is Rogue COHO Team Goal.**

Can a fisherman catch a steelhead each month of the year? Just for the record, my friend Vince Zauskey has. And, I was there to verify that fact.

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January 25, 2003: 1 - 25", 1-28", 1 - 24" 30, 2005 1- 19" ( Takelma 19" on 2-wgt rod, on Blue Dun #14 dry fly)
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February 27, 2005 5 fish to 21 inches 6, 1994 2 fish at 16", 1 at 20" 10, 1995 1 fish at 16", 1-20", 1 -26"

March 13, 2005 1-16", 1-20", 1-22" 26, 2005 1-20"

April 9, 2005 1-29"

May 26, 2001 1 - 26+", 1 - 16" 25, 2002 1- 20"

June 18, 2005 1 - 19"

July 30, 1994 1 -20"

August 30, 1991 1-16", 1-24" both on a Bomber

September 1, 1997 1-19"

October 20, 2004 1 - 18", 1 - 22", 1 - 24", 1 - 26", 1 - 28"

November ?, 2000 1 -18", 1 - 21" 11, 2004 1- 28", 1 - 18"

December 18, 1992 1 - 20", 1 - 22" 31, 1993 2 at 18" (both wild fish)

It may be interesting information that steelhead can be caught every month of the year; but if it is worth while taking the time to write that fact in my notes shouldn't I have taken the short time it takes to include other information, also? Note the 19-incher on a 2-wgt rod and on a dry fly, #14 Blue Dun. Total time to record that fact in my notes, about 5 seconds? Was it of interest that 2 were brought to the surface by a Bomber? Recording time, 5 seconds.

How much more interesting and valuable would the few seconds spent recording water temperature, fly, time of day, turbidity of water, spot on the river, have made the notes when you peruse the data years later. Everyone's memory for details fails, or brings up false data with the passage of time. Would you question your data if it were written down?

Now, let's see: just for the record which is better?
