

November Outing: Coastal Fall Chinook

Chinook are the largest and most popular salmon in Oregon, and many fly fishers consider them to be the state's ultimate trophy gamefish. While several of our members do fish for and have caught Chinook salmon on a fly, most probably have not. For those that would like to give it a try, the Rogue Flyfishers and the Southern Oregon Fly Fishers will join together for an outing to the coast.

The outing is planned for November 17 and 18 at Cape Blanco State Park. This area offers several fishing options: The State Park includes the lower three miles of the Sixes River, giving bank anglers access to several good spots. Three launch sites give those with driftboats or pontoon boats access to additional sections of the river. Anglers can also walk or drive down the beach to the mouth of the Elk River.

Because of the potential for stormy weather to put the rivers out of shape, there is a significant possibility that the date or location of the outing may need to be changed. Because of this, people interested in attending the outing should sign-up with me (David Haight) at the email address or phone number below.

A ten-weight outfit works well for Chinook. Many people prefer a shooting-head system with heads ranging from intermediate to fast sinking, which allows them cover a variety of water depths and conditions; however, full sinking lines will work. Fifteen to 20-pound leader material is appropriate. Clouser minnows and comets ranging in size from about one to two inches long are generally effective patterns. For the Clousers, black over chartreuse, green over chartreuse, chartreuse over white, brown over orange, and orange over white are popular colors combinations. For the comets, green, chartreuse, and orange work well. Bring your usual fishing accessories, and don't forget your raingear.

Cape Blanco State Park offers campsites as well as a few cabins. The cabins can be reserved at reserveaerica.com. For those that don't want to camp, Bandon is about 30 minutes to the north and Port Orford is about 15 minutes to the south. Both have a variety of motels and restaurants.

The Sixes and Elk Rivers provide fly anglers with one of the better opportunities to catch a Chinook salmon on a fly, and the last half of November is considered to be the prime time. If the weather and the river flows cooperate, this should be a great trip.

Status of Law Suit Against Medford For Harmful Sewage Plant Discharge To The Rogue River John MacDiarmid

Back Story

Fishing below TouVelle State Park, the Medford Sewage Plant discharge is very obvious. The effluent bubbles up on the left bank and a long plum of suds, sometimes .4 mile long, is seen working its way across the river. The aquatic vegetation changes also. Thick growths of weeds cover the substrate and algae coats the rocks in all but the fastest water. Long suspecting the 17.5 million gallons per day discharge is harmful and illegal pursuant to the Federal Clean Water Act, The Rogue Fly Fishers raised \$5,000 to do a definitive study of the discharges' impact on vegetation and macro invertebrates in the Rogue. Rick Hafele who had recently retired as the Oregon DEQ chief aquatic entomologist designed the study. He also did the in stream collecting and analyzed of data. A laboratory in Corvallis was retained to identify the insects Rick collected. That was in 2012. The resultant report, Medford Regional Water Reclamation Facility Outfall Assessment Study, was filed in January 2013 and can be found at the Rogue Fly Fishers Web Site.

In Rick's study, the bug life in the riffle above the Sewage Plant was compared to the bug life in the two riffles below the discharge. The downstream riffles are .4 mile (Highbanks) and 1.0 mile (The Willows) below the discharge. The discharge is 130.5 miles from the ocean. The study is very interesting and you are encouraged to read it. One easy to comprehend result is stone fly species diversity. In the first riffle above the discharge, 9 species of stoneflies were found; only 1 stone fly was found at High Banks and 4 species were found at The Willows. It should be noted that two other local fly fishing clubs, Southern Oregon Fly Fishers and Klamath Country Casters helped fund the study and the Oregon Council of the Fly Fishers International (Formerly the Federation of Fly Fishers.) was also a big contributor.

The Federal Environmental Protection Agency has the ultimate authority and responsibility for regulating water quality, however, Oregon, like most states, has been approved to implement the federal program. After the study was published we were hoping Medford would accept responsibility for polluting the Rogue and cooperate in developing a higher level of treatment to this sensitive receiving water. If not, we figured DEQ would rewrite Medford's discharge requirement to protect the river. If neither of these agencies accepted their responsibility, we expected the Regional EPA would step in and protect our river as they are directed to do under federal law.

Since the 2013 Report was filed, no improvements have been made. DEQ did do a Rogue Study and Medford hired a consultant to evaluate the impact of the discharge. Both these studies found similar results to the original 2013 Hafele Report. Clearly, there was only one action left for the environmental community concerned with the Rogue degradation, the courts. Accordingly in October, 2017 the Northwest Environmental Advocates (NWEA) filed a Sixty-Day Notice of Intent to Sue to Remedy Violations of the Clean Water Act, City of Medford, Waste Water Treatment plant. The NWEA retained the Earthrise Law Center at the Lewis and Clark Law School to proceed with the legal work.

Where we are now

NWEA's Clean Water Act lawsuit against the City of Medford was filed in May of this year, and is now well underway. NWEA alleges that Medford's wastewater discharges from its Regional Water Reclamation Facility have caused or contributed to violations of two of Oregon's water quality standards: the "biocriterion," which provides that waters of the State "must be of sufficient quality to support aquatic species without detrimental changes in the resident biological communities"; and the general narrative criterion that prohibits such in-stream conditions as "the development of . . . growths having a deleterious effect on stream bottoms, fish or other aquatic life"; "objectionable discoloration, scum, oily sheens, or floating solids;" and "aesthetic conditions offensive to the human senses of sight, taste, [or] smell..." In its answer dated June 6, the City of Medford denied all of NWEA's claims.

NWEA believes that the existence of these violations has been well-known to both Medford and DEQ since at least January 2013, when the Rogue Fly Fishers and Rick Hafele published the report detailing the impacts of Medford's discharges on the river and documenting nuisance algae growth, shifts in the macro invertebrate community, and other detrimental changes to the river ecosystem immediately downstream of Medford's discharge point.

Subsequent sampling and observations by NWEA, DEQ, and others have only confirmed Medford's ongoing violations, and in December 2016 EPA added the Middle Rogue River (RM 110.7-132.2) to Oregon's list of "impaired waters" under Section 303(d) of the Clean Water Act because EPA found that river segment was not meeting the biocriterion.

The parties are now in the discovery phase of the litigation. NWEA and Medford will exchange expert reports in January; discovery will close in March; and any "dispositive motions" (that is, motions that, if granted, would fully resolve one or both of NWEA's claims against Medford) will be filed by April 12, 2019. NWEA and Medford agreed to bifurcate the case into separate liability and remedy phases; that means the court will first decide whether Medford has violated the Clean Water Act, and only if it answers that question in the affirmative will the parties gather and present evidence on what Medford needs to do to fix the problem. A trial date has not been set, but if needed it would likely be during the Fall of 2019.

Implications

While the NWEA lawsuit deals with one discharge, Medford, it is clear that water quality is mismanaged in our state. Why is DEQ more concerned with protecting the \$ of the discharger than protecting the Rogue River? How many other Oregon rivers are under regulated for water quality?

Gold Fever is when you get the taste of gold and you will stop at nothing to get more! Jobs, relationships, obligations are disregarded. The only thing you can think about is another nugget. In this case those nuggets are huge wild brown trout from the heart of the Mother Lode in the Sierra Foothills of California.
