The Bully of the Farm Pond....

He moved into the West and began bullying the natives. He is big. He has a voracious appetite. His eating habits are, well, insectivorous, piscivorous, carnivorous, omnivorous. In short, he is just plain gluttonous.

He was present in my landlord's home pond when the landlord's daughter cuddled a newly hatched duckling. Called to the phone, she set the little bird down and walked to the house. Just a few minutes later, she returned to find the down-covered bird disappearing into a pink-fleshed "maw". Going down whole.

The Bully multiplied and became Bullies. They terrorized the pond. When you are 15 inches long and weigh in at more than a pound you can do that to the natives, including little Western Pond Turtles and others.

When my landlord contacted the non-game Wildlife Biologist of the ODF/W, he suggested that as a way to benefit the threatened Western Pond Turtles, the Bullies be removed. That's where I, the fly fisherman, came in. With just a hank of macrame I fashioned a floating fly to which they responded as if it were candy. Five Bullies in a season provided the turtles with breathing room and they seemed out of harm's way.

But, everyone knows that nature abhors a vacuum. And. an empty pond is an invitation for more Bullies to move in. And, again this year, with my fly rod in hand, rust colored macrame fly attached, another 5 Bullfrogs to 15 inches came to the fisher's wiles.

I hope to suggest to the non-game Biologist of the ODF/W that if he has a pond that has Western Pond Turtles living in it, that some of us Rogue Fly Fishers could visit it, capture the present Bullfrog population, and regularly visit it to keep removing any which might move in.

It can be fun. For example: 20 June, '05 this happened. Big shiny eyes behind a shiny nose appeared among the cattails close to shore. No casting needed. I dapped the fly within inches of the Frog. They respond when they are ready. When he engulfed the fly furiously he was hooked. Out of the water only to fall back in.

I changed the rust for a white-colored macrame fly of same design. He was out a bit farther from shore. This time, the fly was a foot away from him. He leap-frogged onto it and was solidly hooked. His dive wrapped him into the pond weed. The 3x tippet broke off..

A re-tie with a rust-colored fly placed 2 feet from him. Two jumps across the surface and he was again hooked. This time the 15 incher was landed. I retrieved the white fly with 2-feet of mono in one side of the mouth and the rust-colored fly solidly hooked in the other side. All three hook-ups in less than 10 minutes. Now, that's voracious. And, the whole scenario is exciting.
