OK. So here's the story behind this magnificent 20 lb creature. We at Lemolo Lake Resort have been painstakingly trap netting invasive species tui chub for 8 years now. To my dismay, this beauty entered our net and died. Perfect male specimen German Brown Trout. These were last stocked into Lemolo Lake in 1962, and have been naturally reoccurring ever since. From our trap netting efforts, we have increased the Brown trout population a staggering 2000%. Pick up a current issue of Salmon, Trout, and Steelheader for more info about our fishery.

Larry Ellis did a fine 5 page Brag O Rama on us. Thanks Larry! Clint Cvitanovitch from The Trophy Room taxidermy is mounting this for us, and it will be displayed in our lodge.

While we are disappointed with this unfortunate mortality, we are proud of our efforts in invasive species eradication. We have removed over 80 tons of tui chub, improved water quality 300% and only experienced 44 game fish mortalities.

While not caught on a line and hook, this fish is a testament to a strong natural fishery, and fortifies Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's prediction that the next state record Brown Trout will "Likely be caught in Lemolo Lake."

2015 Chewaucan-Dairy Creek + North Fork. Sprague River Outing

RFF's 2015 Chewaucan Outing will headquarter at US Forest Service **HAPPY CAMP** multi-site campground on Dairy Creek, principal tributary to Chewaucan River. Dates are set four to six weeks earlier than usual, **Tuesday, June 30 to Thursday, July 2** to avoid low water. This site is miles above most irrigation diversions and offers more dependable flows of cool water; last August, flows were still strong in mid-August. In 2013, Bob Schuck landed a nice 22-inch redband trout but seems to have forgotten what fly he was using. Bill Tinniswood, ODFW Fish Biologist suggests Salmonfly and grasshoppers on Dairy Creek and Chewaucan. Some use elkhair caddis or Griffiths Gnat with red tag, and Gary Graham typically tries a Royal Wulff.

Wednesday some will fish the nearby Wild and Scenic North Fork of the Sprague River. Redband and brown trout fishing is good in June and July with good Golden Stonefly and caddis hatches, but any bull trout must be released. Lee Thomas Meadow eases backcast problems, and Sandhill Crossing accesses more timbered settings. Thursday is open to revisit previous reaches on Dairy Creek, North Fork. Sprague, or stretches of the Chewaucan River itself.

You'll need to bring pretty much everything: water, food, shelter and fly gear. Happy Camp has fire rings and a nice toilet, and a few Adirondack-style shelters but there is **no water pump** like the Marsters Springs campground. **Host John Ward** will call to answer your planning questions or call him at **541. 884. 2015**.



Thanks for your interest in my project. Hope you keep finding fish out there. Let me know if you need any additional information or clarification, and I apologize for any errors.


PS: on the second day we removed a computer monitor from the river.
