Jim Wingington, Ph.D



Jim Wigington, Ph.D., is a hydrologist and IFFF Master Casting Instructor. During his 28-year career as a research hydrologist for the US EPA in Corvallis Jim's research focused on the interactions between watersheds and stream hydrology, water quality and ecology. Jim led major research projects on acid precipitation effects on streams, riparian influence of streams, the relationships between watershed and stream characteristics on coho salmon, and hydrologic classification on Pacific Northwest landscapes. Jim is currently the editor-in-chief of the Journal of the American Water Resources Association. Jim has been an avid fly angler for more than 40 years and the linkage between fly fishing and his research has enhanced both.

Jim's program is titled "Snow, Rain and Rock: How Climate and Geology Shape Oregon Trout Streams". He will take you on a visual tour of the state in which you will learn how rain, snow, groundwater and streamflow interact and control streams and fish habitat and fishing opportunities. He will share how this information influences his fishing destination priorities. His insights may get you thinking about fishing some different waters this spring!

Diamond Lake Outing June 17th

The Diamond Lake Outing will be held June 17th and hosted by Steve Day and Keith Hardcastle. We will meet at the Diamond Lake South Boat Launch at 0700, where coffee and breakfast burritos will be served. A brief fishing report will be provided prior to heading out to fish. To access the South Diamond Lake Launch, turn left from eastbound Highway 230 onto the Diamond Lake Access Road. (If you come to the Highway 138 intersection you passed your left turn. Go back west about a third of a mile.) After traveling north approximately half of a mile, you will see a sign on your right that reads Broken Arrow Campground left. Turn left towards Broken Arrow Campground. This will be the first paved left after leaving northbound from Highway 230. Shortly after turning left you will come to a paved road right. Turn right here to access the South Diamond Lake Launch. Parking here is \$5.00 for the day.

Historical weather for this date shows highs in the mid seventies to low eighties with thunder showers always a possibility. Lows range from mid thirties to mid forties.

Diamond Lake is primarily a boat or personal watercraft fishery. If you don't have a boat, plan to be in another's boat or own a personal watercraft, there is some limited shore access at various spots around the lake where fishing can be good, however being on the Lake is the preferred option.

The bugs at Diamond can be quite daunting. While on shore and around the campgrounds and resort, mosquitoes can be a hassle, so bring your bug spray. Once on the Lake, the mosquitoes are no problem however a heavy midge hatch can be challenging if the wind is not blowing. I recommend bringing a buff or other head gear that has bug netting. REI sells head nets for around ten bucks that you simply pull over your hat. This can be a day saver for some.

As far as gear, a single hand rod of any size with floating line and the necessaries for indicator fishing in 5 to 14 feet of water will do well most of the time. Chronomid patterns, pheasant tails, hare ears, calibeatis nymphs all in sizes 14 to 20 and small balance leeches are the most common fly patterns For those who prefer to strip, a rig with intermediate line will serve well most of the time. Wooly buggers, leeches and soft hackles are stripping favorites. A wide range of colors can be effective, however black, brown, olive and claret seem to work best. 

Al Kyte's Casting Study

In 1992 Al Kyte and G.T. Moran published a casting study titled, "The Biomechanics of Distance Casting" You can find this study in the Spring 2015 edition of *The Loop*. *The loop* is the publication of the casting group in the Fly Fishing International (Up until recently the Federation of Fly Fishers.) It is viewable under the headline casting. All members of the FFI have access to *The Loop*.

This is the first of three articles that will be done on the study. This first installment will give some background on Al Kyte and describe the study. The second and third articles will compare and contrast the backcast and forward cast of the two groups of casters: the Elites and the Good. Learning about good form and technique should aid us in improving our cast.

Background and Description of the Study Al Kyte was a P.E. Professor at U.C. Berkeley and thankfully a casting geek. When the Fly fishers International established the casting certification program a few years ago Al was one of the first Casting Board of Governors. They set up all the rules and govern the casting program. Long retired from Berkeley, Al has also retired from an active role in the casting program, he is one of the few Casting Board of Governors, Emeritus. In the early 80s I was a member of the Diablo Valley Fly Fishers in Walnut Creek and so was Al. He was an active member of the club and a down to earth pleasurable person. He liked telling the story that early in his teaching career he was a high school football coach and so was his father. Their two teams went up against each other and Al's team won. He has also published two books: *Fly Fishing, Simple To Sophisticated* and *The Orvis Guide To Better Fly Casting*.


When videos first came out, Al was quick to see the value of this tool in analyzing the cast. Watching and braking down the cast with the naked eye is like trying to see an Atom with any kind of visual aid, it can not be done. We somewhat guess what is happening based on the results. Videos with freeze stops changed all that for understanding casting. The laboratory was the U.C. Berkeley gym where Al set up 2 stationary cameras aimed at a casting station. A black curtain with vertical and horizontal lines hung on the wall behind the casters. White dots were placed on the casters at critical spots: wrist, elbow, hips, even ankles. Twenty of the best casters in northern California cast from this spot while the cameras were rolling. They all used the same rod (9' 7wt.) and the same line. Also they held the line with their line hand at the same spot (46') and they made their longest cast shooting the line. The beauty here is the study eliminated so many variables and they were able to compare and contrast the casters styles and techniques. Based on the casting results, the casters were grouped into two groups, the Elite casters that had a mean distance of 80' and the Good casters that had a mean distance of 71'. There were 9 casters in each group, data from two middle distance casters was removed. In summary the Elite Casters did 13 things different or better than the Good Casters. The next article will discuss the differences in the backcast between the two groups and a third article will discuss the forward cast differences. This will give us some things to think about to improve our casting.

Casting at Club Meetings!

One of the benefits of our new meeting place beginning in June, there is plenty of room to practice our casting on the grass. John MacDiarmid our Casting Chair will facilitate the casting on the North side of the main restaurant where there is a large open flat area. When you arrive at the restaurant just drive around the building to the North parking lot. You will see us casting beginning at 5P.M. Bring your rod or use the clubs.

Many thanks to Steve Day who was determined to improve our meeting situation. The Centennial has good food, the setting is outstanding and we can CAST. THANK YOU Steve, I am sure you will not have to buy your own beer at the meeting!

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
