Ramblings of a Fly Tyer

Gray Hackle Yellow



This month's fly is an old American wet fly. The Gray Hackle Yellow is one in a series of 23 flies by James Leisenring (1878-1951), a professional tier from Pennsylvania. He co-authored "The Art of Tying the Wet Fly and Fishing the Flymph" with Vernon S. Hidy. He experimented considerably in the field of nymphs and nymph fishing, non-weighted or lightly weighted, and originated the "Leisenring Lift" style of nymph fishing. Let's get started.

Hook: Daiichi 1550-1560; Mustad 3399A (these you will have to hunt for, but I have fun collecting), or your favorite hook brand, heavy wire wet fly style, sizes 2-14.

Thread: Yellow & Black 16/0 thru 8/0 (I use yellow throughout and use either black lacquer or black pantone marker to color the yellow, when needed)

Tag: (Optional) Gold oval to match hook size **Tail**: Red hackle fibers or red goose shoulder

Body: Yellow floss or wool **Hackle**: Grizzly hen hackle

This pattern has been one that I have used since I was a teenager. I now tie it in small sizes for all trout, a little larger for half pounders and larger, still, for summer run steelhead.

Ramblings of a Fly Tyer (extra)

Might as well start by rambling. One of our members, Chuck Huntington, a retired (sometimes) fisheries biologist, got me to measuring bugs and I found out that even the insects within the same hatch can vary by up to an 1/8". I normally start off my recipes with hook and size. This can be confusing to a lot of people. There is actually no standard on hook sizes between brands, for that matter, there is no standard within a brand. If you go to any book and they say to use a 1530, size 16, how long is that? Daiichi, my favorite hook brand, has 12 styles of dry fly hook, all #16 vary in length. Other hook brands are just as bad. So, to my point, (with Chuck's help) I am measuring the bugs I collect from top to bottom and then measuring my hook, then matching the sizes. I don't care if a pattern calls for #16, if a #14 or #18 matches better, use that size. So, for those of you that tie, try to get a little closer to the bugs and start a fish/tying log. Call me if you need help.

Follow-Up: Rogue Flyfisher's Resolutions on Liquified Natural Gas (LNG) Pipeline

In a private meeting last week at Jordan Cove's LNG office in Klamath Falls, many of Rogue Flyfishers' concerns about serious negative impacts of their proposed natural gas pipeline project were discussed with Ms. Shar Post. As many readers know a Canadian company proposes to build a 328-mile natural gas pipeline crossing under 400 rivers, streams and waterways in Klamath, Jackson, Douglas and Coos counties. March 2019 RFF Newsletter (page 7) noted, RFF Board concluded the project provides little if any benefit to our local area. Ms Post requested and has been sent RFF Board's Resolution listing about ten specific concerns.

Concerns include adverse impact on wild Salmon and Steelhead spawning redds, instability at bank and trenched stream crossings with clearcut vegetation, proposed mitigation of risks due to construction of LNG pipeline and export facility have not been demonstrated to be adequate in three consecutive plan reviews by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC).

John and Anita Ward visited the Jordan Cove LNG office in downtown Klamath Falls Feb. 27, 2019 to discuss Rogue Flyfisher concerns with their proposed LNG pipeline and export terminal.



RFF Conservation Committee

The club's Directors have recently funded or are thinking about funding multiple grant proposals for conservation related projects. Recently issued RFF grants include \$5,000 to Northwest Environmental Advocates in support of technical and legal work on remedies to Medford's pollutant discharges into the Rogue River below TouVelle State Park, and \$1,000 to the Rogue River Watershed Council (for Rogue Fish Migration Day in Grants Pass on April 6 and their annual *Celebrate the Rogue!* fundraiser/gala in Medford on October 26). Grants pending or under consideration include \$300 to Friends of the Greensprings (contingent on a \$1,500 grant from the Oregon Council and another \$1,500 from the Fly Fishers International), \$1,000 to Waterwatch, \$500 to Project Healing Waters, and \$100 as a potential sponsor of Festival on the Rogue 2019.

The work being done by Northwest Environmental Advocates has been well described by John MacDiarmid in past RFF newsletters.

The Rogue River Watershed Council is a local non-profit that plans and implements projects that restore fish passage, native riparian vegetation, water quality, and habitat along the area streams that produce our salmon, steelhead, and resident trout. The group works with private landowners and others to do work that helps maintain the fishery resources we enjoy here in the Rogue Basin.

Friends of the Greensprings is a small non-profit focused on environmental conservation and led by RFF member John Ward. The group is purchasing water temperature loggers and working with the Rogue River Watershed Council to monitor stream temperatures at key locations for ESA-listed Coho Salmon in the upper Rogue River watershed. Waterwatch is an Oregon non-profit well known to club members for conservation work focused on responsible water use. In our area, it has played a central role in large dam removal projects and in monitoring water use practices. Project Healing Waters is a non-profit that helps rehabilitate military veterans through fly fishing. Within our area it works closely with the White City VA Rehabilitation Center to help veterans learn to fly fish and educates them on fishery conservation issues.

Festival on the Rogue is a fun annual event put together by community volunteers from the Shady Cove area with organizational support from the Rogue River Watershed Council. The 2019 festival, to be held at Rogue River Regional Park in Shady Cove on June 8, will focus on the river and its watershed as valued natural assets. Last year the Rogue Flyfishers had two exhibits at the festival, one providing fly tying demonstrations led by Dave Roberts and another that gave casting demonstrations and lessons led by John MacDiarmid. The club is planning to put two similar exhibits in the park this year, with fly tying led by Dave and casting led by Bob Pierce. Festival proceeds in excess of costs go toward local stream restoration projects. Club members are encouraged to attend the festival and support one of our river-dependent communities.

An Introduction To The Art, Science and Joy of Fly Fishing

In this one day class for beginners and novices, you will learn everything you need to get started fishing the Rogue for steel head and trout. The class will cover wading equipment, rods, reels, lines, leaders and flies. Basic knots will be taught and there will be a section on entomology, aquatic insects, and the flies that imitate them. The final lesson will be on presenting the fly and casting. If you have a rod, reel and line, bring it but do not go out and buy one for the class. We will cover what rod to buy in the class. The club has rods for the class, let the instructor know if you will need one. Each year in late May and early June a large stone fly hatch occurs in the upper Rogue River above Shady Cove. The class will cover how to fish this hatch.

You must be a current member of the Rogue Flyfishers to take this class. There will be an optional \$10 charge to cover the cost of a small book, The Curtis Creek Manifesto.

The class will be held on May 11 from 9 to 3:30 at the club house for the Madrone Hill Mobile Home Park. The park is located at 8401 Old Stage Road not far from Gold Hill. Traveling North from Medford on I-5 take Exit 40 at Gold Hill and proceed South on the Old Stage Road towards Jacksonville, the park is well identified on the right.

John MacDiarmid, a Fly Fishers International Certified Casting Instructor, will be the class instructor. Email him at johnmmacdiarmid@gmail.com to register for the class. There will be a limit of 12 students, you must be pre registered to attend.
