On The Fly

PATTERN OF THE MONTH-Z-Wing Caddis

Hook: Daiichi 1120 or equivalent, curved, heavy wire scud hook, size 14-

20.

Bead: Optional, small copper.

Thread: Olive 8/0.


Rib: Chartreuse monocord or equivalent 3/0 thread. Wingcase: Golden brown turkey tail feather slip. Body: Buggy nymph dubbing, olive/dun blend.

Wing Pads: Light dun to dark dun Z-Lon or poly yarn.

Collar: Buggy nymph dubbing, caddis green.

Head: Peacock herl.

Tying Instructions:



- 2) Tie in the thread for the rib and let it hang to the back.
- 3) Tie in a slip of turkey tail for the wingcase and let it hang to the back.
- 4) Dub the thread and wrap it forward to the thread tie-in point and tie off.
- 5) Pull the wingcase over the dubbed body and tie-off.
- 6) Wind the rib material forward in five even turns, then tie-off and trim both the rib and turkey slip.
- 7) Tie in a one-inch piece of Z-Lon or poly yarn on top of the hook and tie down the material so each end of the yarn sticks out on opposite sides of the fly. Trim the yarn wing pads to about 3/4 the length of the body.
- 8) Dub the thread for the collar and wind it forward halfway to the eye (or bead).
- 9) Tie in a couple peacock herls, twist them around the thread, then wind forward to form a head. Whip-finish and apply cement.

The Z-wing caddis was developed by Mike Mercer of Redding, California, as his improvement to the famous Deep Sparkle Pupa of Gary LaFontaine, not that it needed improvement. The curved hook gives a natural, hunched profile. The wingcase of turkey tail with its mottling and hairy appearance gives realism not found in synthetics. The mixtures of colors in the dubbing and the contrast of colors at the collar gives a natural insect look. The Z-Lon or poly yarn used as wing pads to imitate the semi-formed wings, creates the transparency and shape. And of course, peacock herl for the front collar glitters with an attracting iridescence unequaled by any other material. Together these components make up one of the most effective caddis pupa imitations available today.

For the fly fisher, day in and day out, throughout the season, it is the pupa – that transitional form of the caddis between larva and adult – that gets the job done. This is the stage where the larva begins to take on aspects of the adult, releasing from the rocks and rising towards the surface. As such it is fished from bottom to top in the water column. Designed primarily for moving water, the pattern can be tied in a variety of sizes, with or without a bead. Three colors can cover hatches throughout the season: lime green in the spring (Mothers Day), olive on cloudy days or in the fall, and amber all year. The Z-Wing Caddis is a design that is relatively simple and fairly straightforward. Most important it looks like what it is supposed to be imitating and works.

TYING TIPS

The body should be dubbed heavy with a slight taper. When you pull the wingcase over the body, be careful to not pull too tight because this causes the turkey tail material to split and thus expose the body material on top. When you tie the Z-Lon up against the body dubbing this will naturally splay the fibers at a 45-degree angle to the hook shank. This is a moderately easy pattern using common materials. So tie some up and give them a test flight. Let me know how they work.

RFF CASTING CLASSES 2020

For 12 years we have been having open casting with lessons every Monday evening thru the summer. We have a new venue for 2020. As soon as it is safe for us to gather again, we will have specific classes with signups. Classes will be limited to 6 casters; we will need a minimum of 3. You may sign up for one or more classes though we will try to spread the classes out to as many members as possible. The Classes are as follows:

THE BASIC CAST- This will be for anyone that needs help with the basic cast.

ROLL CAST- This will be an on the water lesson. You need a good roll cast to indicator fish still water. Think East Lake club outing.

PRESENTATION CAST We strive to eliminate slack in the cast...except for the presentation. Slack is necessary for a dead drift in dry fly fishing. We will also cover the tuck cast for nymphing.

DOUBLE HAUL- If you have a good solid cast and you have not added the double haul, you are missing out. The double haul allows both hands to put the bend in the rod.

DISTANCE- Who among us does not want to add distance to our cast? This lesson will focus on making the basic cast better and adding a few new techniques.

You may register for the classes at any time by emailing the instructor at johnmacdiarmid@gmail.com. I will respond with a confirmation. The classes will be held on Monday evenings as soon as it is permissible for us to gather, hopefully by June 1.

April through June Outings

As we near the end of March, the situation and restrictions related to the Coronavirus outbreak are changing rapidly. Both Oregon and California have issued "Stay at Home" orders, which affect our ability to hold outings. As a result, we are working with The Fly Shop and the members who have paid to go to Sugar Creek Ranch to reschedule that outing to a later date when hopefully the situation has improved. The Beginning Fly Fishing Class we were planning for May will be cancelled for the time being. We will see about rescheduling this class once our lives get back to a more normal routine. As it stands now, the next outing still on our schedule will be to the Umpqua River on June 20 to fish for smallmouth bass. Hopefully this crisis will be subsiding by then and we will be able to hold this outing as scheduled; however, the Board of Directors will be monitoring the situation and will make a decision about this outing and other events as we get closer to that time.

While Oregon's "Stay at Home" order requires people to stay home except to take care of essential business, it does allow us to go outside to get exercise as long as we comply with "social distancing" requirements. I looked at the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife's website, and as of March 24, it said we can go fishing as long as we follow those "social distancing" requirements. People that are not living in the same residence should not ride in the same vehicle or boat and should stay at least six feet apart. It did say a number of parks, boat ramps, and recreational facilities will be closed. ODFW advised anglers to stay close to home, stay away from high-use areas, find another location to fish if there are already a number of people at the location you intended to fish, and to contact the land manager of the location where you would like to go to find out about closures or restrictions. We should also remember that Coronavirus can survive for several days on surfaces, so if you go out, try to avoid touching things that others may have touched, and use proper hygiene—especially sanitize your hands.

I look forward to seeing everyone when the club can get back to a normal schedule. Until then, stay safe!
