


SACRAMENTO RIVER OUTING

An Introduction To The Art, Science and Joy of Fly Fishing

John Pogue and John MacDiarmid will conduct a fly fishing class for beginners on Saturday May 6. In this one day class participants will learn everything needed to fish the Rogue for steelhead and trout. The class will cover wading equipment, rods, reels, lines, leaders and flies. Basic knots will be taught and there will be a section on entomology, aquatic insects, and the flies that imitate them. The final lesson will be on presenting the fly and casting. If you have a rod, reel and line, bring them but do not buy equipment for the class. We will answer the question, what rod should I buy? The club has rods for the class, let the instructor know if you need a rod. Each year in late May and early June a large stone fly hatch occurs in the upper Rogue River above Shady Cove. The class will cover how to fish this hatch.

You must be a current member of the Rogue Flyfishers to take this class. You can join on line at the club's website. There will be a \$10 charge to cover the cost of a small book, The Curtis Creek Manifesto.

The class will be held on May 6 from 9 to 3:30 at the Madrone Hill Mobile Home Park club house. The park is located at 8401 Old Stage Road not far from Gold Hill.

The Lake Selmac Outing / Clinic, will be held on Wednesday, April 12th. We will meet at the south pavilion located near the Lake Selmac Disc Golf Course at 9:00.

We will meet and talk about basic Stillwater Tactics, equipment, and techniques, and provide some guidance for success when fishing Stillwaters.

Lake Selmac is located approximately 18 miles west of Grants Pass via Hwy 199. Once thru Selma you will turn left at Lakeshore Drive and travel south to the lake. Stay left and circle the east side of the lake. There are signs directing you to the Disc Golf Course.

Lake Selmac can be fished effectively from almost any fishing platform. Boats, personal pontoons, and float tubes will all work well. The lake is stocked in Spring and Fall with Rainbow Trout and has a well-established population of Largemouth Bass, Crappie and Bluegill. Fishing in the Spring can often be very good.

Fly rods from 3wt to 6wt are appropriate. Floating lines for indicator fishing and hover or intermediate lines are best for stripping. Small Wooly Buggers and Soft Hackle flies work well stripping and Chironomid patterns and small nymphs such as Hare's Ears or Pheasant Tails and Balanced Leeches are very effective under an indicator.

Steve Ostrander Receives the Dick Ruff Award

The Dick Ruff Award was created in 1976 to honor those members of the Rogue Flyfishers who through their time, efforts, and/or resources helped to promote the purpose of the club to its highest level. includes promoting the conservation of fisheries and other natural resources, promoting recreational resources, and promoting fly fishing. The award is given only when warranted, and is the highest honor the Rogue Flyfishers can bestow on a member. Throughout the club's history only about a dozen members have been awarded this honor. At the March meeting, Steve Ostrander was presented with the Dick Ruff Award and joined this prestigious group!

Steve has served as the Rogue Flyfishers' newsletter editor and webmaster since the early 2000s. He has published a newsletter each month—no matter where he has been or what he was doing. He has completed and sent out the



newsletters even while fishing in Alaska and while in hunting camp. Steve has on occasions made long drives into a town to get internet access to complete this work.

As webmaster, Steve posts the meeting announcements, newsletters, and other important information to keep the club members informed. The website also archives information about the club's history, and has resources for fly anglers.

Keeping these lines of communication going have been and continues to be essential to the success of the club. Without Steve's dedication, hard work, and commitment of time, the club would not be able to function and fulfill our purpose. Plus, a number of our members first learned of the club through the newsletter or website.

In addition to those tasks, Steve has served the club in other ways, volunteering to help with various projects.

Thank you, Steve, for all you have done and continue to do for the club. We appreciate your efforts.


Raising funds to expand our gear closet will help us fulfill this mission.

I had the opportunity to take one of our Board members, Susan Labiste up to fish my favorite section of Rogue at McGregor Park a few weeks ago. Blue Winged Olives and March Browns were coming off well. However, not a fish rose, so we even tried dry droppers and soft hackles. Not a bite in four hours, so we decided to get burritos at Trail market.

After lunch we went to the Holy Water and arrived around two pm. I noticed some fish rising within five feet of shore and could not see what they were rising for. So, I set Susan up with a 12-foot 4x leader and 2 feet of 5x tippet and tied on a size 22 Befus black pullover midge that I had tied over 25 years ago. Well, our day was complete with a beautiful trout on the Holy Water and a great smile!

So the moral of the story is, if nothing is working, take a break and try something different. It worked for Susan even though I didn't get a touch all day (yes, that means skunked!).

2023 OWYHEE RIVER OUTING – MAY 17 - 21

You are correct, it is quite a drive to get there...8-9 hours depending on how you drive. However, it can be a wonderful couple of days of breathtaking views and perhaps some very large Browns. If not the big boys, there are plenty of 12" – 20" fish. Afternoon bite could be a PMD hatch, or the multitudes of midges for dry fly action. Last May yielded fish on stripping buggars, nymphing chironomids, pheasant tail nymphs, BH hares ear patterns, and then be ready with dry flies when the time is right. General size flies I've found to work are between 14 - 20s. Though throwing large streamers slowly across the bottom can produce some pretty large fish in the early mornings and once the sun is off the water in the early evening.

Camping is all along the river on BLM land, I will try to get the larger areas as the Host campsite. It is all dry camping. We will do a potluck early dinner on Saturday. I will provide brats. I will be giving further details to those of you interested in coming out via text messages.

The comment has been made to me in the past that the \$25.00 cost for the dinner at Centennial Golf Club is too much and we should reduce what we make on the dinners and charge a lower price. If there was a way we could reduce the price we would, but regardless of what we have for dinner at Centennial, we get charged \$25.00 per meal. So we don't make a penny on the food. As a matter of fact, we actually lose money because we don't charge whomever we have as a speaker for their meal, plus there is usually one or two others that don't get charged anything for various reasons. On top of that, we have to guarantee Centennial a minimum of 50 dinner reservations. If we end up with anything less than that, we eat the cost (no pun intended) of any shortfall. We understand that circumstances may mean that someone who makes a reservation may end up not being able to attend, but hopefully that only happens in case of an emergency, not that things just got too busy or something else of interest just came up.

We are fortunate to have a number of well qualified local people who are willing to give a presentation at our meetings, usually at no charge to the club. That isn't always possible though, and there are times we have a pay a speaker plus cover at least lodging costs. As many of you know, we try to minimize this cost by occasionally sharing a speaker with SOFF but that isn't always possible either.

Finally there is the raffle we have at each meeting. Fortunately we are able to get items for the raffle at a reduced or even no cost on occasion, so the money we made there is usually enough to cover all the other costs.

So, please, get your dinner reservations in early, show up when you make a reservation, and BUY RAFFLE TICKETS!
