Message from the President

What a difference a couple of weeks make. In last month's message I was whining about my lack of results in the catching fish department, and was even starting to doubt my ability to attract a fish to my fly. Well, that all changed with 5 days at Klamath Lake a week ago. The fish turned on somewhat and in six outings on the water I was not "skunked" once. Granted, there were a couple of times when I only caught one or two fish, but even with that it is very satisfying because they are all usually large fish. The highlight, however, was the morning when I fished for 3 hrs. and I hooked 12. Of those I landed 8 with the smallest one being 19 inches. The largest was 23 inches and he was bright and beautiful.

I can't wait to get back over to the lake, but the sad thing is that I won't be able to fish anywhere for at least two weeks. I just don't understand how a calendar can fill up so quickly and none of it having anything to do with fishing. I just don't think I am doing this retirement thing correctly.

Anyhow, I hope you are getting out on the water and enjoying some success yourselves.

We had a very productive board of directors meeting last night and even spent some of the club's funds on some very worthwhile projects. You may have read in the newspaper about the Southern Oregon Land Conservancy's effort to raise 3.5 million dollars to purchase a large tract of land on the Rogue River upstream from Dodge Bridge. To that effort, the club has donated \$3000, with the possibility of donating more in the future when the time comes for biological assessments and other projects to be done. The Conservancy is accepting private donations as well, so if you are inclined to help preserve this very unique property, please donate.

The club also donated \$500 to Water Watch to help them offset the costs they incurred while working to help secure the moratorium on Suction Dredging.

Much of the meeting was spent on conservation issues. John Ward, our conservation chairperson, gave a comprehensive report on a variety of issues in which he is involved, both as the club's representative and as a private citizen. He will highlight some of these issues at the general meeting in September.

For those members who have wanted to actually get outside and work in the dirt, I believe the future is going to hold several opportunities for club involvement. Ryan Battleson, the new to area STEPs biologist for ODFW, attended the meeting and shared with us several of projects he is currently working on and those he hopes to create in the future. In doing so, he presented a variety of options for the club to engage in activities that involve the enhancement of the fishing resource we all hold dear. Because many of the projects are still in the planning stage, I will not attempt to go into any detail at this time, but should have more information by the meeting in September.

Please be reminded that there will be **no general meeting in August**. There will be, however, a very enjoyable Dinner and Wine Social at Daisy Creek Winery in Jacksonville on August 13. If you have not purchased you ticket, and are planning to attend, you need to do so by August 5.

If you have not yet done so, I urge you sign up for the club's blog. It provides up to the minute information, between the monthly club newsletters. And, don't forget to check the club's website which teems with information.

Last year I was able to meet some of you either at the festival in Reedsport or in Albany, I could not make the trip to the coast, and will miss the festival coming up next weekend. That said, we are planning the Umpqua Valley Festival scheduled for September 10, 2016. We would like to invite you to be a guest tyer at our 8th Annual Fall Festival at the Glide Community Center on the North Umpqua Highway. Many of you have participated in the past; we appreciate your support, and want to continue the tradition but there is always room for new faces and ideas. The Sound Of a Fly Rod

If you are heading over to Livingston, Montana in early August for the annual IFFF Fishing Fair, I encourage you to participate in and/or watch the 5wt. games. This is a casting competition with 5 wt rods that the very best casters enter. There is a series of cast to targets followed by a distance cast. The way these casters load and unload their rods is simply amazing, a few will deliver the yarn fly over 100 feet. AND it all appears so effortless!!! You will notice there is no noise emitted by the rods of these casters, the rods are SILENT. The rods are progressively bent right up to the end of the cast when they are suddenly stopped and the line is launched like an arrow from a f ully drawn bow. Many novice casters, on the other hand, achieve line speed in the cast by rapidly moving the rod back and forth with an accompanying swish/swish sound. Hey, it gets the line out there far enough to fish, but the caster is not getting the full benefit of the technology in the rod. Why buy a \$800 rod if you do not use that technology? With some instruction and a lot of practice, this can be corrected. Instruction is available at the Medford Hedrick Middle School every Monday (except holidays) at 6:00 P.M.

August Outing to Howard Prairie

The Rogue Flyfishers and Southern Oregon Fly Fishers will have a joint outing to Howard Prairie Reservoir on August 20. Howard Prairie was previously one of the best rainbow trout fisheries in the region, and was popular among the members of both clubs. Unfortunately, largemouth bass and smallmouth bass were illegally introduced into the lake and ruined the rainbow trout fishery. In response, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife revised the stocking strategy, switching from a spring release of tiny rainbow trout fingerlings to a fall release of five to six-inch trout, supplemented by occasional releases of catchable-sized trout. Consequently, the rainbow trout fishery at the lake has improved dramatically. It is not as good as it used to be, but it can be pretty good--producing trout over 20-inches in length. Howard Prairie also offers good fishing for both largemouth and smallmouth bass.

For those interested in giving the lake a try, we will meet at the Willow Point Boat Ramp at 3:00 PM and fish into the evening. In the heat of summer, the best fishing will be early and late in the day. Those that are interested can spend the night and fish the next morning as well. The Jackson County Parks Department has a number of nice campgrounds around the lake. In addition, the Howard Prairie Resort offers cabins, a marina with boat rentals, and a restaurant. Information about the campgrounds, resort, and day-use facilities can be found at www.jacksoncountyor.org/parks.

There is plenty of access for fishing from the bank, but fishing from a watercraft is often more productive. At Howard Prairie, you can use anything from a float tube to a large motorboat. A six-weight rod would work well for both the bass and trout, but you can go lighter if you want to primarily target the trout. Bring your floating, intermediate, and sinking lines. Stripping woolly buggers should work well for both the trout and bass. The lake has the usual assortment of stillwater insects and invertebrates (midges, damselflies, dragonflies, mayflies, backswimmers, leeches, and snails), so bring an assortment of standard stillwater patterns. Add Clouser Minnows and streamers to your box if you plan to target the bass. Also bring dollar bills to pay the \$4.00 day-use fee if you don't have a Jackson County Park's pass.

If you haven't fished Howard Prairie in a while, come give it a try. The fishing may pleasantly surprise you.

1. OARSMEN: We are also reaching out to those of you who would really enjoy rowing your boat while providing a great day of tournament action for our anglers.


