#### OREGON SALMON

The recent frightful accident which happened to a stage in southern Oregon cannot fail, says the New York Times, to call attention of the state authorities to the necessity of protecting settlers against the attacks of salmon. The stage in question was crossing Applegate Creek when it was suddenly attacked by a drove of salmon. The stage was instantly overturned, and the hungry fish swarmed over it, while the stage driver, with great presence of mind, cut the traces of the horses and, throwing himself across the off wheel horse—a powerful animal—formerly the property of Dr. Goodrich, of Olympia—managed to escape. The dispatch which conveys to us this painful story says nothing of the fate of the stage passengers, but, unfortunately, there is every reason to believe that they fell victims to the salmon.

The Oregon salmon has long been regarded by experienced western hunters as the most dangerous animal infesting this continent. It is much larger than the salmon of the Atlantic coast, and unlike the latter, which is timid and inoffensive, this fish is fearless and aggressive. #### RAMBLINGS OF A FLY TYER

For me, most of the dry fly fishing has slowed down on the Rogue, here locally. Not that there aren't a few hatches still coming off, but with beautiful bright days, the fish close to the surface become cautious of the flying predators and spooked by the 'rubber hatch'. That said, the steelhead are in the river. It's true they are not stacked up in front of the creeks like in the fall. You may have to hunt a little for them, OK, a lot, but for me, that's part of the fun. I prefer water types where I can swing a traditional wet fly. Most of the time you will find me swinging an Undertaker, Red Ant, Silver Hilton or a Rogue on an 8 ½' to 9' bamboo rod and 10' to 14' leader from a boat.

#### This month's fly is the Rogue



**Hook:** Your favorite steelhead hook

Thread: Black

Tag: Flat or oval small tinsel
Tail: Red hackle fibers
Body: Peacock tail herl
Rib: Silver oval tinsel

Hackle: Grizzly beard or full hackle


Wing: White polar bear, calf tail or artic fox

Cheeks: Jungle cock Head: Black Thread

The style I like this time of year is the low water style. Not because it's low water, but because I can tie a size 6 fly on a size 1 or 1/0 iron or hook to get it down without weight and let it swim. If you like another style, that's fly tying.

## EAST LAKE OUTING

The East Lake Outing finally went off without a hitch. After all the anxiety with the rush for reservations in the Cinder Hill Campground, things came together. The Outing was well attended and I believe everyone had a great time!



The week started off wonderful. The weather on Monday was superb with light winds and very willing fish. Tuesday started cold, with the lake cloaked in low clouds and weather reminiscent of Fall. Although cool, it was calm, with some frost and ice on boats early. Tuesday evening however, was a different story. High winds showed up late and blew very hard throughout the night and continued thru Wednesday morning. We pulled a couple of boats out that morning that had been anchored along the shoreline. My boat in particular had about six inches of water in the stern that had splashed over the transom from wave action overnight. The remainder of the week was typical, yet cool for July, with calm mornings and winds out of the west in the afternoons. And yes, it was true that there was a full moon most of the week.



Now for the catching. The fishing was good but not great. I believe everyone I spoke with had some success, with some doing much better than others. It was not as wide open as I've found it to be this time of year, however the quality and size of the fish were some of the best I have experienced at East. The Cold Front during the week and the full moon most certainly contributed to the mood of the fish and the modest activity of the insects. The famous Callibaetis Mayfly hatches occurred each day but were meager in comparison to what East Lake can produce. One noteworthy observation however, was the size of the Lake's Kokanee. For those that caught these awesome sport fish, they were rewarded with very robust and aggressive fighters. Several of these landlocked, Sockeye Salmon, topped twenty inches with sixteen to seventeen inches being average! And they are always a hoot!

She was given the award in 2000 in recognition of the tremendous amount of work she did with the watershed councils, the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, and other organizations to benefit fish populations in the Rogue Basin. She was especially effective in obtaining funding and coordinating projects to remove barriers to anadromous fish passage. After receiving the award, Rose Marie became active in the club, regularly attending meetings and outings.

A celebration of life will be held Saturday August 24 at 2:00 PM at the First Methodist Church in Ashland.

September 18<sup>th</sup> - Traditional Steelhead Flies for swinging on the Rogue River,


September 25<sup>th</sup> - Flies for Bug & Bubble fishing (group two flies),
