Etched in Stone

(Or, What Does Flycasting Have to do With the Code of Hammurabi, c1750 BC?) By Otis D. Swisher

Anyone who has been to school has probably heard of the Code of Hammurabi; that code of laws etched in cuneiform on that giant seven and a half foot tall stone "stele" for his Kingdom of Babylon during the second millennia BC. It is referred to often as one of the earliest codes of social law to be "set in stone."

I like to compare those laws to some of the ideas that have been carried down through the years as "How to's" for beginners to the art of fly casting. Ideas which have had a similar exalted place...if you will, as though "set in stone." But which have failed the test of time.

For example: Code of H , Law No.1 " If a man has accused another of laying a NERTU (death spell) upon him, but has not proved it, he shall be put to death"

So, too, how many fly casters follow the early admonition, to "Tuck the elbow firmly against your side, as if holding a book in place against your rib cage?" That may have been good advice for small Eastern streams, in the time of the Pilgrims, or for 30 foot casts today. How about for general casting today?

Also, Code of H, Law No. 200: "If a patrician knocked out the tooth of a man that is his equal, his tooth shall be knocked out."

So, today, what about that often quoted maxim "Stop the rod at 10 and 2 on the face of a clock?" Is that a rule etched in stone? Is there no place for Lefty Kreh's "give the rod full extension behind you and parallel to the water to really make the rod load when you come forward for that 60 and 70 foot cast?"

Code of H, Law No. 239: "If a man has hired a boatman, he shall pay him six GUR of corn yearly."

And today, when I cast, should I feel as though my back is against a wall, as illustrated by Joan Wulff in her great series about fly casting, making it necessary for the rod tip to be high in the air, and the back cast always to "punch the sky?"

Again, Code of H, Law No.195: "If a boy struck his father, they should cut off his hand (or fingers, translations vary)."

And today, what if I am facing the wind, casting into it, so the line is being thrown about not where I want it, but where the wind dictates? Is it o.k. for me to use a "side arm cast" which lets me drive the line and the fly along/near the water's surface where drag has slowed the wind's force?

Code of H, Law No 236: If a man has lent his boat to a boatman, and the boatman has been careless and the boat has been sunk (as mine was at Savage Rapids dam removal site) and lost (but, mine wasn't lost) the boatman shall restore a boat to the owner."

And, again in today's post Hammurabi's world) when I am casting, if I want to put my fly UNDER the overhanging tree branches close to the river's edge? Do I have to do my best overhand cast even if it puts the fly into the branches? Or, may I use a side arm cast, parallel to the water so I can slip the fly under those pesky branches to that soft water where the fish are holding waiting for terrestrials to fall on the water and join them for a meal.

Code of H, Law No. 234 "If a boatman has built a boat of sixty GUR for a man, he shall pay him a fee of two shekels of silver."

And in today's world of aches and pains, if I have developed a rotator cuff problem so I can't raise my casting hand and arm in the usual manner, is it written in stone that I can't find a "comfort spot" such as a side arm (as mentioned above) or a three-quarters angle so I don't have to live with the pain in my shoulder?

If anything is "set in stone" for the caster, it has to be "find your comfort spot". And even more important, learn to "shock stop" on both forward and backward casts. MAKE THE ROD DO THE WORK. I have seen a fly line "HURLED" for 30 feet by some one who didn't even have a rod in hand, just by flicking the line. It was tough, tiring work hurling by muscle power alone. It goes without saying, the rod, as a lever of 7 to 15 feet, makes casting easier, more graceful, and more satisfying. Make it do the work.

PS At the suggestion of my editor, my son Mark the retired fly fishing guide, that this heavy tome needs a little lightening, I add here a personal observation: I wish that Hammurabi had been a fly fisher so he could have included another 7-foot stele illustrating the flies he used. Think of how great an addition to historical archaeology it would be if he had commanded his skilled artisans to etch the fishing flies he was accustomed to using onto such a stele. Then we could compare our Rogue River's Pteronarcus Californicus with his Tigris - Euphrates Rivers' "Giant Stone" Fly.

New Year's Day Chili Feed

The Rogue Flyfishers and Southern Oregon Fly Fishers will continue our tradition of celebrating the New Year with a chili feed at the Holy Water. This annual event was started over 20 years ago; thus, is one of our club's longest running traditions.

We will meet on New Year's Day at the picnic shelter near the parking lot on the south side of the Holy Water. The fire should be going by 10 AM, and the chili will be served about noon. There will be opportunities to fish both before and after we eat.

We need volunteers to bring pots of chili. In recent years, the number of people bringing chili has declined; therefore, we have not enjoyed the variety we have in the past, and have even run short. To counter this trend, last year, Mike challenged people to a competition for the best pot of chili. It was a lot of fun, so we will compete for bragging rights and possibly a small prize again this year. We also need a person or two to bring fire wood. Others can help out by bringing cornbread, salads, desserts, or other items to share. The clubs will provide hot drinks and table service.

While catch rates are not what they were in the good ol' days, the Holy Water has been producing some really large fish this year. During the winter, drifting midge patterns under an indicator is normally a productive technique. Stripping or drifting small marabou leeches, woolly buggers, or nymphs along the bottom can also be productive during the colder months. If the weather and flows cooperate, we could even have a blue-winged olive or midge hatch. If you are going to fish, remember to get your 2015 fishing license.

The Holy Water Chili Feed is a fun way to celebrate New Year's Day. The food is good, the company is great, and you might even catch your first fish of 2015. Bring a pot of your favorite chili, and you could take home top honors from the chili contest.

BOAT FOR SALE

The boat is probably 30 years old but it is in very good condition: it was built by Larry Westfall, a local boat builder (who died several yrs ago) and is heavier gauge aluminum than new boats are built of. We bought it from Steve Godshall, who bought it from The Fishin' Hole in Shade Cove when he guided for them.

It is 15 1/2 feet long, 48" bottom width and 76" wide at the gunnels. It has 3 wooden Sawyer oars, 2 of which were re-finished with new Kevlar edges by Sawyer last year. Jack put new epoxy bottom paint on it this spring, put in a new rower's seat, bought 2 new tires, had the wheel bearings repacked and put in new carpeting. It has space for 2 seats in front and one in back with stand up stanchions front and back. Of course, sale includes life jackets, anchor and roping, a small ice chest. The boat is easy to row, easy to handle----I became very comfortable rowing it with Jack and even a 3rd person in it. Anyone interested can call
