## **Message from the President**

If we want good trout fishing in our future, we must expand our vocabulary beyond catch quotas, gear restrictions and stocking practices and become more conversant in the lingo of water supplies and disaster preparedness. How we manage our water supplies and prepare for large and damaging floods, drought and wildfires increasingly will shape the fate of our trout fisheries"

In the face of the over-whelming issues and needs, what can we do as individuals? One of the first things we can do is to be informed. A major thing we can do, of course, is be in contact with our elected officials and urge them to act in a way that helps insure the future of fishing. The other is to join one, or many, of the environmental groups that are working so hard to repair, protect and enhance our water ways, our public/private lands and our air quality. Realizing that there is strength in numbers, I would urge all members to join one or more organizations that promote the values we hold dear. At the top of my list is Water Watch, an organization founded by a former president of the Rogue Flyfishers. Water Watch has been instrumental in the fight to keep water in rivers, lakes and stream and the organization has been very successful in causing fish killing dams to be removed. It also works hard at the legislative level to help shape and protect the state's water use laws. Join as yearly member, or, better yet, contribute on a monthly basis. Your money will be well spent.

Two other organizations that do tremendous work are The Federation of Fly Fishers and Trout Unlimited. Both those organizations work at a national level and keep members informed through their excellent publications. Add to the mix Oregon Wild, The Nature Conservancy, Sierra Club, The Native Fish Society, League of Conservation Voters (a bit more political, but great for identifying candidates who are strong on conservation issues) and many more. It is simply a matter of choosing one that fits with your interests and beliefs and sending a check.

Once again, thanks you all for a most enjoyable year and I wish all a happy holiday season and the best of everything in the new year.

## Kicking off the Second Largest Dam Removal in California

This month, NOAA and partners are breaking ground on the second largest dam removal in California. The Benbow Dam, on the South Fork of the Eel River, is a safety hazard. It also limits threatened Coho and Chinook salmon, and steelhead, from reaching their upstream habitat. Its removal will help contribute to the recovery of these species.

When the dam was built in the 1930s, water built up behind it, forming a 123-acre lake. The lake has been used for swimming and boating, and was also a tourist attraction for the past 50 years.

However, the dam limits access to upstream habitat during the winter. It also prevents water, sediment, and wood (from trees) from flowing downstream naturally. This lack of natural flow has reduced the quality of habitat near the dam.



Before the dam was built, roughly 20,000 Chinook and as many as 17,000 Coho salmon swam past the dam site. In 2010, there were only 1,000 Chinook and 500 Coho in this part of the Eel River.

The dam is also causing safety issues. The banks of the lake have eroded due to the unnatural wave action caused by the lake and sediment accumulation upstream of the dam. The lake is surrounded by redwood trees, but erosion is causing the banks to be unstable, and they are toppling over. The dam itself is in poor repair and could become a liability.

NOAA Fisheries, along with the California Department Parks and Recreation began removing the dam this week. The project will improve passage to nearly 50 miles of high-quality spawning and rearing habitat, assisting with the recovery of salmon and steelhead. The removal will improve habitat in the former lake area. The California Conservation Corps will also plant native vegetation along the banks, along with other measures, to help control erosion.
