

The focus of my job is to develop the implementation plan to reintroduce and monitor the repopulation of anadromous fishes into Oregon following the removal of the Klamath hydroelectric dams, as well as lead pre-dam removal studies. I pride myself in being able to work with a diverse group of stakeholders to achieve a common goal on large fish restoration projects. I enjoy backpacking, fishing, hunting, skiing, mountain biking, and really anything outdoors

President's Message from David Haight

December is one of the slowest months for fly anglers in the Rogue Valley. Access to most of our favorite trout lakes is blocked by snow and ice, bass and other warmwater fish are lethargic and very difficult to catch, and fishing for summer steelhead is winding down as the fish get ready to spawn. Many fly fishers use this time of year to maintain equipment and tie flies.

For those that do want to get out on the water, there are opportunities. Several mid-elevation lakes offer good trout fishing this time of year: Those that are low enough to remain free from ice and heavy snow, yet stay cool enough during the summer to allow trout to survive. Lost Creek Reservoir, Applegate Reservoir, and Willow Lake are some of the best examples.

The paved Takelma Ramp at Lost Creek Reservoir remains useable at all but unusually low water levels. Lost Creek Reservoir has a good population of rainbow trout, with a lot of quality-sized trout. Landlocked chinook are also present, but generally require fishing deeper than necessary for the rainbows. The lake has a small population of brown trout, some of which reach impressive sizes. During the fall, the brown trout and some rainbow concentrate where the Rogue River flows into the reservoir. For those willing to make the long trip up Cascade Gorge to the inlet, fishing streamers can produce some nice fish. There is a trail that follows the north side of the reservoir and river that could be used to access the inlet on foot, but the last time I hike it, it was practically impassible due to downed trees and washouts. The best locations for fishing from the shore are the area around the Takelma Boat Ramp and the flats accessible from Medco Road and Stewart Park.

Like Lost Creek, Applegate Reservoir offers good fishing for rainbow trout and landlocked chinook during the winter. The only usable ramp is in French Gulch, which is just east of the dam. The ramp can be muddy and depending on the water level, it may be challenging to launch larger boats. The best areas to fish from the bank include French Gulch, the Squaw Creek Arm, and the head of the reservoir.

Willow Lake has rainbow trout that usually provide good fishing during the winter. The lake has a paved ramp, but it is not always available during the winter. Willow Lake offers plenty of bank access, and is a good place to use float tubes and other small craft that can be carried to the water. Like the other lakes mentioned here, when it is foggy in the valley, it is usually sunny at Willow Lake.

Local rivers also offer good opportunities for fly fishers during the month of December. The Rogue, Applegate, and Illinois Rivers all have rainbow and cutthroat trout. These fish can often be tempted with small nymph patterns. Hatches of midges, Blue-winged Olives, and other insects can provide good top-water action. The best bank access and fishing can be found on the Rogue River from Casey Park upstream through the Holy Water. The Rogue also offers several good sections to float for those with a proper boat and skills. All wild trout in these rivers must be released.



For those willing to travel a bit further, winter steelhead enter most of the coastal streams in fishable numbers in December. The streams open to winter steelhead fishing along the Southern Oregon Coast range from small creeks to large river, and offer a variety of opportunities to both bank and boat anglers. Remember that if you are going to fish for steelhead (even catch and release) in the Southwest Zone from December 1 through April 30, you need to get a Rogue-South Coast Steelhead Validation in addition to your angling license and tag.

Auction Status

PROGRAM:

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission approved the removal of the four lower Klamath hydroelectric dams on the Klamath River. The removal of these dams will allow access to hundreds of miles of habitat for anadromous fishes that have been blocked for over 100 years. The schedule for dam removal is set to begin in 2023 with full passage available in late 2024. In preparation for dam removal and the subsequent repopulation of anadromous fishes into Oregon, ODFW and partners have developed a strategy for monitoring Chinook Salmon, Coho, Steelhead, and Pacific Lamprey. Along with developing a monitoring strategy, ODFW and partners have conducted and continue to develop multiple pre-dam removal studies that investigate the basin-wide genetics of *O. mykiss* as well as the migratory behaviors and survival of juvenile Chinook Salmon in the upper basin. This presentation will summarize the habitat and fisheries of the Klamath River Basin, dam removal, the strategy for monitoring repopulation, genetic population structure of Steelhead and resident Redband and Rainbow Trout, and summarize initial results associated with a multi-year mark-detection study of released juvenile Chinook Salmon in the upper basin.

McBear's Black Syn Carey (trout spey for lakes or rivers),
McBear's Stuck in the Shuck March Brown
