

Jet Boats and More

So, what's happening with the jet boat issue? At the time of writing this article, the Oregon Marine Board has released its proposed rule which can be found here: https://www.oregon.gov/osmb/info/Documents/Rulemaking/NoticeUpperRogueRiver.pdf.

The proposed rule says:

- 9) Upper Rogue River and its Tributaries:
- (a) No person shall use a motor in excess of 10 horsepower to propel a boat between Fishers Ferry County Park and William L. Jess Dam, (Lost Creek Dam).
- (b) Notwithstanding the above provision, the use of motors above 10 horsepower are allowed between the dates of May 8 and September 10, on the main stem of the Rogue River between Fishers Ferry County Park and Dodge Bridge County Park.
- (c) Subject to the above seasonal horsepower restrictions, Charter boat operations:
- (A) Charter boats may not operate upstream of Rattlesnake Rapids.
- (B) Between Table Rock Road Bridge and Rattlesnake Rapids,
- (i) Charter boats may only operate between the hours of 10 am and 5 pm.
- (ii) The total number of all charter boat trips may not exceed 300 trips per year.

Are you OK with this? With the noise? With the increased potential for boating accidents? With the disturbance to spawning beds? With the vegetation which fouls fishing lines and flies? With the shore erosion? ? Is it fair and equitable for one company in the operation of its business to negatively impacts all other users of the river?

The Marine Board requests public comments on whether other options should be considered for achieving the rule's substantive goals while reducing negative economic impact of the rule on business. Please let your concerns be heard!

But let's also look beyond this issue. What's our vision for how we want to engage in the conservation of our fisheries? Currently, we don't have a strategic plan for how we want to engage on conservation issues. Before forming our vision, it's helpful to understand what's needed and what other organizations are already doing. Quite frankly, I'm trying to get up to speed my self.

The best document that I've been able to find is the Rogue-South Coast Multi-Species Conservation Management Plan (December 2021) https://www.dfw.state.or.us/fish/CRP/docs/rogue_south_coast_multispecies/RSP_main_final.pdf. This document describes the current status of native species to the Rogue River, the various threats, limiting factors, management strategies and actions. The plan contributors include the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, several tribes, the US Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Trout Unlimited, Klamath -Siskiyou Wildlands Center, the Southern Oregon Flyfishers, and many more. This plan can serve as a helpful document to learn about these issues and serve as a guide for us to evaluate what's needed to restore and maintain native fish in the Rogue River. But its not the only source of information of what's needed. It's helpful to talk those who have been involved in conservation efforts on the River for years.

Fortunately, there's several local organizations and agencies who have been and are currently involved in conservation efforts. A few them were present at our annual auction including the Rogue River Watershed Council and WaterWatch. But there's so many more organization doing work include the Middle Rogue Steelheaders, the Upper Rogue Guardians, the Forest Service, and the Bureau of Land Management, just to name a few. I met with Steve Burns - fisheries biologist with the Rogue-River Siskiyou National Forest in November about partnership opportunities. He informed me that the forest has just ten percent of the capacity it used to have to care of the upper Rogue. He mentioned a need to replace boat cleats at boat ramps at some of the lakes we fish. He also mentioned a need to replace the signs and kiosks which have worn out over the years. The Middle Rogue Steelheaders have adopted a section of the middle Rogue River. Perhaps we can do the same on the upper Rogue. I also need to acknowledge our own Bob Hunter who has tremendous knowledge and experience. We would be wise to listen to Bob.

So where do we go from here? I'd like to get a group of us together (either virtually or in person) to help formulate a plan. We could continue to just do what we're doing know - providing grant money to a few organization who actually to the work, or we could do more. It's really up to our membership.
