2016 NW Fly Fishing & Fly Tying Expo by Garren Wood

The Northwest Fly Fishing and Fly Tying Expo is an annual event put on by the Oregon Council of the International Federation of Fly Fishers. The 2016 Expo will be held March 11th and 12th at the Linn County Fair Grounds in Albany, Oregon. The doors open each morning at 9:00am. This is an event you will want to put on the calendar now.

The main attraction is over 200 demonstration tyers that rotate every 2 ½ hours over the two days. There are 70 tyers tying at individual tables with chairs provided to sit and watch the tyer. All of the fly genres are covered including nymphs, dry, steelhead, classic salmon, streamers, and realistic flies. If you are not sure who to watch, the best thing to do is to walk around the tyer tables



and find an open seat. Even if you are not interested in a specific type of fly, a lot can be learned by sitting down and watching a tyer demonstrate different techniques. Tyers will have tips on material selection, tying tips, and sometimes fishing tips for the patterns. They are also able to answer questions during the demonstration. It is one of the best ways to learn and improve tying skills.

Classes are offered each day for fly tying, casting, and fly fishing. Classes are limited in size, so it is a great opportunity to learn in a classroom environment. There are some casting classes that are 1 on 1, which provide excellent opportunities to work on specific casting problems. There are casting classes that cover both single and double handed casting. The fly fishing classes will help prepare you to go to a specific location.

You can signup for classes on the Expo **website** http://nwexpo.com, starting in January 2016. The classes change each year, so make sure you check out what is being offered this year. Over 50 exhibitors attend the expo and offer great deals on everything from fly tying materials, fly rods and reels, fly fishing art, and boats.

The Expo presents an opportunity to see a wide variety of items in one place. Exhibitors often offer special show discounts and will also have new items available for purchase. There are many art items that are one of a kind and make special gifts. Throughout both days there are silent auctions and raffles. Exhibitors and participants make wonderful donations that are used for these purposes. The event concludes with a live auction and banquet Saturday evening. The live auction offers one of a kind framed flies along fly rods and other special items. During the banquet two college students that are majoring in fishery management are awarded scholarships. The students give a short talk on what they are studying and it provides a look-in to the research that is being done on fisherman's behalf.

The Expo is put on by the Oregon Council to provide education to the general public on fly fishing and fly tying. The revenues generated by the Expo are also used by the Oregon Council to provide educational programs on fly tying, casting, and fishing throughout the state of Oregon. The Council also supports conservation projects with the proceeds.

We hope to see you at the Expo in 2016!

FLY TYING CLASS WET FLIES & SOFT HACKLES

INTERMEDIATE LEVEL



PATTERN OF THE MONTH - Ice Dub Egg

Hook: #10 egg - D1120, U 202

Thread: orange

Bead: 5/64" gold - brass or tungsten

Wire: .015 lead

Egg sac: chartreuse chenille or dubbing - sparkle OK Abdomen: hot or burnt orange dubbing or ice dubbing

Hackle: 2 wraps of white CDC - this is optional, but I am a fan of CDC.



Tying Instructions:

- 1) Pinch down hook barb and slip the bead on, small hole first. I usually make 2 or 3 wraps of .015 lead onto the hook and slide it into the bead. And then add a tiny drop of super glue. The lead provides more surface for the glue to adhere to. Check to be sure the glue doesn't seep out to the hook eye! As soon as the glue comes out, tip the hook eye upward. The glue is optional but this beginner finds that it stabilizes the bead while I wrap the rest of the fly.
- 2)Make a thread dam behind the lead wire as the glue will eventually soften in the water. (Gorilla super glue is said to be the most waterproof, but I don't know). Then wrap the thread back to the bend.
- **3**)Strip about c" of fuzz off the chenille, tie it down and take the thread forward a few wraps. Make 2 or 3 wraps of the chenille forward for the egg sac, tie it down and snip the excess. You want the egg sack to be visible but small but small compared to the abdomen.
- **4)**Make a 3" dubbing loop and run the thread up to the lead wire let it hang. I find ice dub easier to handle after a swipe of wax on one side of the loop. Form a generous string of dubbing, center it in the loop and spin it with your whirler until the strands stand out. Wrap the dubbing up to the bead area, forming a rather large oval abdomen as you go. The abdomen should be noticeably bigger than the egg sac. Stroke the dubbing back as you tie it down to make a little room for tying in the CDC.
- **5**)Tie in a white CDC feather by the tip, make 2 wraps and tie down. Do a couple or 3- or 4-wrap whips and you are done!

RFF member Steve Day shared this pattern with me, for which I am most grateful. Tie some up and you will be, too! Fish it about two feet below your stone fly. Steve says it can be tied in other colors as well, such as pale yellow, apricot, oranges and red. Good luck!

February Outing--Winter Steelhead on the Lower Rogue

The Rogue Flyfishers' next outing is scheduled for February 13, when we will head to the lower Rogue River near Gold Beach to fish for winter steelhead. The lower Rogue is a big river with large gravel bars and long runs well suited to swinging flies with a long rod. If you don't have a Spey or switch rod, don't worry, the steelhead usually travel close to shore within easy range of single-handed rods.

We will meet for breakfast at 8:00 AM at the Indian Creek Cafe located a short distance upstream of Hwy 101 on the south side of the Rogue (94682 Jerry's Flat Road). If you don't want to eat breakfast, join us there by 9:00 AM.

The lower Rogue River offers plenty of opportunities for both bank and boat anglers. Many of the large gravel bars are publicly owned and easy to get to, giving bank anglers plenty of places to fish. Drift boats, pontoon boats, jet boats, and even prop boats (if you are careful) can be used to access other good locations.

For equipment, seven to eight-weight Spey or switch rods paired with Skagit heads and an assortment of tips would be ideal. Similar weight single-handed rods with sink-tip lines or sinking shooting heads will also work. Bring 10 to 15-lb tippet material and an assortment of flies--from traditional steelhead patterns, to egg-sucking leeches, to intruders. Black or purple flies with a bit of bright color mixed in are often effective. If you prefer to dead-drift egg patterns or nymphs, you can do that too. Pack your waders and rain gear as well.

There are a variety of other fishing options in the area. If you want to try a smaller stream, Hunter Creek and Pistol River have good runs of winter steelhead.

Gold Beach has a good variety of lodging and dining options, and there are several RV parks and campgrounds along the river. You can find more information at www.goldbeach.org.

With the wet weather we have experienced so far this winter, there is certainly the possibility that the river could be out of shape, causing us to relocate or cancel the outing. Be sure to check the club's website before you leave for the outing to see if we had to make any last-minute changes.
