LNG Pipeline

As most of you know the LNG pipeline has once again become a local issue that will affect many of our friends and neighbors. This proposed pipeline if it is approved, will intersect the Rogue River and highway 62 at Trail, Oregon. We all have been through there many times on highway 62 and on the river. As one might expect there are many local citizens and property owners who object to this pipeline being forced upon us. I use the word forced because this foreign multi-national energy company will be allowed to use eminent domain to shove this down our throats.

I have contacted a number of people about this issue and have had some very good response. Many have committed to sending letters and we can make this easy for you. Myself along with others will share the contents of the letters we are writing. These can be example or sample letters that you can use to compose your own letters. We can also provide addresses of where to send these letters. Given the current political climate regarding natural resources, we need to hit this with a strong voice and not stop until this a very dead issue.

One of our number has been negatively impacted by this proposed pipeline. The very minute this pipeline scheme was announced, their property value went down many thousands of dollars. This was about 2008. They have lived with this possibility ever since. The real insult is that there is no possibility of any sort of compensation because the actual pipeline will be on the property of their neighbors. The story gets worse because the neighbors property is the staging yard and the drill site for drilling under the Rogue. Later it will be the service yard and pumping station. Imagine having that mess for a neighbor.

We have had some victories but we need a lot more. U. S. Senator Merkley has changed his position and is now opposed to the pipeline. Oregon State Geologist, Brad Avy has reported some of the aspects of the project analysis inaccurate and misleading. The article in the December 12, 2017 issue of the Mail Tribune is worth reading.

Going forward the Southern Oregon Fly Tyers have agreed to be a part of this by using their blog as a place to find information to expedite the letter writing. Their blog is http://soflytyers.blogspot.com. Bookmark it for your convenience. When the holidays are over more information will begin to appear under the tab "LNG Pipeline". Just click on the tab. Keep checking back because new and updated information will be forthcoming.

January Outing--Winter Steelhead on the Southern Oregon Coast

January is typically one of the slower times for fly fishers in the Rogue Valley. Many people pass the time by tying flies, but for those that want to fish, the streams along the Southern Oregon Coast can offer great fishing for large winter steelhead fresh from the ocean. Opportunities range from swinging flies through long runs on large rivers like the Rogue or Chetco to dropping nymphs into pockets on small streams like Hunter Creek or the Pistol River.

For our outing on January 13 and 14, the Rogue Flyfishers will make a trip to the coast. We will meet for breakfast at 8:00 AM on Saturday in the Indian Creek Café, which is located a short distance upstream of Hwy 101 on the south side of the Rogue River at 94682 Jerry's Flat Road. If you don't want to eat breakfast, join us there by 9:00 AM. We will decide where to go from there based on river conditions and the desires of the group.

If conditions are right, the lower Rogue offers plenty of good opportunities for bank anglers. It is a big river with large gravel bars, many of which are publicly owned and easy to access, and long runs well suited to swinging flies. Seven to eight-weight Spey or switch rods paired with Skagit heads and an assortment of tips would be ideal. If you don't have a Spey or switch rod, don't worry, the steelhead usually travel close to shore, so single-handed rods, of similar weight, with sink-tip lines or sinking shooting heads also will work. Bring 10 to 15-lb tippet material and an assortment of flies--from traditional steelhead patterns, to egg-sucking leeches, to intruders. Black or purple flies with a bit of bright color mixed in often work well.

For those interested in fishing the smaller streams, there are several good choices near Gold Beach. For these streams, bring an eight-weight single-handed or switch rod with a floating line and an assortment of weighted nymphs and egg patterns. Be sure to bring your waders, a wading staff, rain gear, and normal fishing accessories.

Gold Beach has a good variety of lodging and dining options, and there are several RV parks and campgrounds along the river. You can find more information at www.goldbeach.org. Due to the uncertainty of river conditions during the winter, be sure to check the club's website before you leave for the outing to see if we had to make any last-minute changes.

A Temporary Refuse Pool By Lee Spencer

Of all the books of interest to fly fishers, this one stands out...way out. It is fresh, it is original, it is different. Lee Spencer has a commitment to understanding and perpetuating steelhead far beyond that of a ichthyologist or an obsessed chrome chaser. He has discovered things never known before about our fish by quietly sitting by the Refuge Pool eight months out of the year for 18 years...protecting...observing and recording. The Pool, with up to 700 adult steelhead, is located on Steamboat Creek a tributary of the North Fork of the Umpqua R. He is paid a small salary by the North Fork Foundation to protect the fish from those who would harm them. At the time the Foundation and Lee Spenser took on this responsibility, the Pool was known as the Dynamite Hole. The byproduct of this effort is this wonderful book. 
