### President's Message from David Haight

This is my last President's Message. It has been an honor and a pleasure to serve as your President for the past two years. I am proud to be a member of this club and am proud of all the things this club has accomplished over the years.

In the 1970s, shortly after the club was founded, I attended several meetings of the Rogue Flyfishers with my father. I moved out of the area to attend college and to work in other parts of the state. I became a member of the club in 1990, shortly after I moved back to the Rogue Valley. I have been an active member of the club since. At first my involvement was primarily as a student: attending monthly meetings, outings, and workshops; and taking fly-tying and rod-building classes. After a couple of years, I started taking on more duties within the club: participating in habitat projects; helping teach classes; hosting outings; and helping in various ways at the meetings. I joined the Board of Directors in 1999, and subsequently, have served in a variety of roles in the club.

In the early years, the club was extremely vibrant and active. We participated in numerous habitat enhancement projects, provided testimony on issues that affected our sport or the environment, provided environmental education to school children, conducted classes on all aspects of fly fishing for members and the broader community, hosted outings and other activities, and raised money for various projects. Fly fishing was popular, and we had a steady supply of new members.

More recently, the club has been struggling. We are certainly not the only club in this situation. Younger people are less inclined to join traditional clubs, which is making it harder to attract new members and maintain an active membership. We don't have people teaching classes, leading outings, volunteering for projects, or taking on tasks as readily as we have in the past. For the first time that I am aware of in the club's history, we failed to recruit a single new member to the Board of Directors. We were forced to postpone the auction from next May to October in a large part due to a shortage of members willing to help organize and prepare for it.

While no individual is obligated to perform any tasks or duties for the Rogue Flyfishers, the club will be what the members make of it. If enough people are willing to contribute a little, we can have a successful, vibrant club. If we leave it up to a few individuals to carry the workload, we will struggle to even carry on the basic functions of the club.

For me, attending monthly meetings has been fun and educational, but getting involved in additional aspects of the club has made being a member of this club much more enjoyable and valuable. Many of my best friends and fishing partners are people I got to know through serving on the Board or working on various projects. I have a much deeper understanding of how the club works and what it does. My membership in the Rogue Flyfishers has been enhanced by getting more involved with the club, and I think most of the members of the Board of Directors, Committee Chairs, and other volunteers feel the same.

I hope everyone enjoys the holidays, and I look forward to see you all next year.



# Letter from the Board of Directors regarding Killer Whales

Dear Chair Wahl and Commission Members:

The Rogue Flyfishers is a nonprofit organization based in Medford, OR with over 160 members. We have been active in fishery and conservation issues for over 50 years. We, as an organization, are concerned about the declining population of Southern Resident Killer Whales, and we support their listing as an Endangered species under the Oregon Endangered Species Act. At present there are only seventy-three Southern Resident Killer Whales left, they face a variety of environmental hazards, a shortage of prey, and lack of genetic diversity.

The state of Oregon should follow suit with British Columbia and Washington to list the Southern Resident Killer Whales as Endangered. These government entities already have plans for the recovery of the killer whales' prime food source, the Spring Chinook Salmon.

The Rogue Flyfishers encourages the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission to list the Southern Resident Killer Whales as Endangered under the Oregon Endangered Species Act to help ensure their survival and recovery.

# Coastal Winter Steelhead Outing, January 20 - 21

Several of my favorite places to fish during the winter months are streams along the Southern-Oregon Coast. The Rogue River, Chetco River, Winchuck River, Hunter Creek, and others can offer great fishing for winter steelhead. These streams range from small creeks to large rivers, and offer fly fishers options from drifting flies through small pockets to swinging flies through broad runs.

The Rogue Flyfishers and the Southern Oregon Fly Fishers are planning a joint outing to the coast on January 20 and 21, to fish for winter steelhead. We will base the outing out of Brookings, which has a good variety of motels, RV parks, and restaurants. The specific streams we fish will depend on the conditions at the time. Participants should bring equipment for both swinging and dead-drifting flies. For swinging flies, a seven or eight-weight Spey rod with a Skagit head and a variety of sink tips would work well. A single-handed eight-weight rod would be ideal for fishing the smaller streams. Bring a variety of intruder-style flies, from bright to somber, for swinging, as well as egg patterns, large nymphs, and egg-sucking leeches for dead-drifting. The winter steelhead on the coastal streams can be large, so 10 to 15-pound leader would be appropriate. Be sure to bring waders, a wading staff, raingear, and warm clothing. You will need to have a Rogue-South Coast Steelhead Validation in addition to your Angling License and Combined Angling Tag. We will focus on areas that offer good opportunities for fishing from the bank; however, the lower Rogue and Chetco Rivers do offer good opportunities for those that want to fish from their driftboats or rafts.

People interested in attending the outing should email me at <a href="mailto:tmdrhaight@infostructure.net">tmdrhaight@infostructure.net</a> by January 15 to get on the list. Just prior to the outing, I will make a decision about what streams we will fish and when and where we will meet, or if we need to postpone the outing due to weather or water conditions, and I will send out that information to the people who have signed up.

# McBear's Fyre Flyes tm for Steelhead



The hooks I use are Daiichi 2161, in sizes 1 (larger flies for Oregon rivers) and 6 (smaller flies for Trinity and CA coastal streams), because I like the rounded bend, slightly curved up tapered eye and shorter profile for these flies without tails.

Recipe: My Original Design (McBear's Fyre Flyes tm for Steelhead)

Hook, as above, Daiichi 2161 in size 1 or 6

Thread - Uni 6.0 Black

Hot Butt - Uni Stretch in Chinese Red, Hot Orange, Chartreuse or Pumpkin

Body - Fyre Werks in purple, copper, teal blue or pearl,

Wing - 2-3 loops of the body material (cut, picked out with dubbing needle, and cut to 2/3s length of body)

Hackle - Artic Fox in two sections (Black and some other color like salmon for the copper and purple or hot orange for the purple Fyre Werks)

Note - Both sections of Artic Fox are placed in a dubbing loop with base fibers cut short, spun into dubbing rope and wound on with a good stroke back after each wrap forward.

Head - Black Uni thread - double whip and head cement.
