In the rivers, we are seeing some of the better returns of salmon and steelhead we have seen in several years. Hopefully this will lead to a great summer steelhead season on the Rogue.

Chuck Huntington put on a very informative program about fishing with dry flies in lakes for trout. He shared a number of tips that should be especially helpful to those of us that wish we were more successful during the Callibaetis "hatches" at East Lake and Crane Prairie Reservoir, but will apply to other lakes as well.

Speaking of Crane Prairie, Steve Day hosted our June outing there. The weather was rather cold and windy, and consequently the fishing was not as good as it could have been; however, we did catch a number of nice Cranebows", and it was great to spend time visiting around the campfire. In late May, Mike Masters led an outing to the Owyhee River, known for its outstanding fishing for large brown trout. Mike knows this fishery well, and was able to provide the club members who attended the instruction they needed to catch a very good number of quality brown trout.

As usual, the club will not hold dinner meetings in July and August. We will still have other activities during the summer, including outings: On July 13, I will lead an outing to Klamath Lake to fish for large redband trout (look for details in this newsletter), and Jerry Haynes will lead and outing into the Sky Lakes Wilderness August 13 - 15.

In September, we will resume our dinner meetings at Centennial Golf Club. Centennial has provided us with a great venue for our meeting, and has been very good to us. In order for them to keep providing us with this service, they need to sell a minimum of 50 dinners each month. We easily met this number at our meetings prior to the COVID pandemic. The meetings we have held since then have had much lower attendance. If we want to keep meeting at Centennial, and in general, have our club get back to what it was prior to COVID, we need our members to resume their participation in the meetings and in other events. I certainly hope that enough of us will attend the meetings so that we can remain at Centennial. It would be a shame to lose such a wonderful venue, and we don't have any other good options.



Holy Water Update

Salmon flies and large trout were on at the holy water this year. Hope you got a chance to enjoy some nice days there. I was able to fish many times though out the hatch this year and had some memorable fish on and many more miss takes as I learned where that word came from. Staring in mid to late may the flies started showing up there but talking to other fishers and myself agreed they weren't landing on the water and the trout didn't want to show up yet. On into June it decidedly got better by the first week of June it was game on. Talked to many people some older club members who don't live here anymore but still visit for the hatch. Most people were getting a couple fish a day some more and all larger fish. On any given morning to early afternoon there were 6-8 fishers out and seemed like half the cars were out of state. Still not crowded, and the salmon flies were crawling and landing everywhere. On june 10 we had our first RFF roadside cleanup put on by Paul Seymour, it went very well and Don Dabney and I and Paul made short work of covering the road and park areas. We even got in some fishing ourselves afterwards. I was startled by two large rattlers facing off on the dirt road along the Highway near the slide and concrete pylons. They were more interested in who was going to impress who and let me take some video. Beware. It's June 22 today first day of what appears to be a great summer with the past rainfall and hope we keep getting some, just not the lightning with it. Fished today and had my best day, using my new claymore trout spey in 3 wt. from Rogue Valley anglers. It put it to the test coaxing the large bows upriver into a net. Bends nicely. Enough for now, hope you get away for some enjoyable days on the water this year.

Outing to Upper Klamath Lake

Upper Klamath Lake supports one of the best trophy trout fisheries in the United States. Its fertile waters produce redband trout well in excess of ten pounds. During the summer, as the water in this shallow lake warms, the trout concentrate in the cool springs and tributaries that enter the lake. Pelican Bay, on the northern end of the lake, is fed by several springs and is an area where a lot of trout spend the summer.

The Rogue Flyfishers will have an outing to Pelican Bay on Wednesday July 13 to fish for these trophy trout. Since some people like to be on the water at first light and others like to make a more leisurely trip over the mountains, participants can head over to fish as early as they like. We will then meet in the parking lot at the Rocky Point boat ramp at 9 AM to share information about locations and techniques for targeting these trout.

Because of the possibility of hooking into a really big trout, a six or seven-weight rod would be a good choice. Casting and stripping flies is the most common way to target these predatory trout, but fishing a balanced leech or midge pattern under an indicator can also be productive. For casting and stripping, a clear intermediate fly line is typically the most useful line while fishing Pelican Bay. Leaders tapering to 3X are usually adequate, but you may need to go lighter if you fish right near the clear springs. Bring the usual assortment of stillwater patterns. Woolly buggers and leeches are typically go-to patterns on Klamath Lake, but at times, damsel, Callibaetis, or midge patterns can be effective. There is limited opportunity to fish from the bank, so a floating device (anything from a float tube to a powerboat) would be a benefit.
