Bill has worked in the fishery field for over 20 years. His profession led him all around the State of Oregon (Lakeview, Ontario, Gold Beach, Corvallis, Portland and Klamath Falls, since 2003). Bill grew up in Keno and Klamath Falls. He graduated from Oregon State University in 1998 with a Degree in Fisheries and a Minor in Entomology. Bill is currently a Fish Biologist with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. His favorite place to fish is Upper Klamath Lake. Bill has spent most of his career studying, enhancing and protecting Redband Trout populations. Most recently, ODFW partnered with Oregon State University, studying the movement, diet and condition of Redband Trout from Upper Klamath Lake. Bill will present findings of this study as well as numerous fly-fishing techniques for various locations in the Lake.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE from STEVE DAY

"A REASON FOR HOPE"

Since the inception of the Rogue Flyfishers in 1971, there has been an unwavering commitment to the environment and specifically to the conservation of Anadromous Fishes by our Club. Many of our Members past and present, as well as countless other groups and individuals, have dedicated a great deal of time, effort and life, to improve the world in which we, and these resilient creatures live. Whether it be removal of dams or fish passage barriers, riparian improvements, education or any host of other efforts with the hope that those efforts will bear fruit.

Often times we get overwhelmed by the process that is required to do simple things that, (at least to us) make sense, the amount of time it takes to accomplish what needs to be done and the arm twisting and politics involved in the process. Quite often, the results come very slowly and the rewards of those efforts can be years and often decades away. I for one, watch for those positive results that come from years of dedication and those unwavering commitments by many.

Recently I was browsing through one of many media sources that report on issues that impact, Anadromous Fishes. An article titled "The Phoenix in the Elwha River" caught my eye. For years, I have watched the process that led to the removal of the Elwah and Glines Canyon Dams.

This process began in 1992 when Congress passed the "Elwha River Ecosystem and Fisheries Restoration Act". Two decades of planning led to the removal of the Elwah Dam in September of 2011 and the removal of Glines Canyon Dam three years later. For the first time in 100 years, the Elwah River ran free from its headwaters in Olympic Nation Park, to the Strait of Juan de Fuca.

Fast forward to the Elwha River on the Olympic Peninsula of Washington State today. Rob Masonis authored the article, "The Phoenix in the Elwha River". Rob is the Vice President for Western Conservation for Trout Unlimited.

This article and its' findings gave me "A REASON FOR HOPE". I am truly impressed, by the manner in which the environment will heal and with Steelhead in particular. When given a chance these fish find a way to survive.

I contacted Rob and asked for permission to reprint his Article in the November Newsletter. He gladly agreed and complimented our Club on the efforts that we have made over the years to improve the watershed in the Rogue Valley.

I want to encourage everyone to read Rob's article. RAMBLINGS OF A FLYTIER

Sometimes the simplest pattern is the best. The floating nymph can be adapted to all mayflies. In this case, the blue winged olive or BWO. By the way, the blue is really different shades of grey and the blue is a throwback to the Brits. Locally the BWO is found on the Holy Water and the main stem of the Rogue River. Let's get started on the pattern for the BWO

Hook - Daiichi 1330, 1480 size 16 -20, or your favorite dry fly hook


Thread - Brown, the smallest you are comfortable using

Rib – Small copper wire

Tail – Pheasant tail barbs

Body – Pheasant tail barbs

Wing case & wing – dun comparadun deer hair





The fly is put together in the sequence of the parts listed above. The hook can be any dry fly hook 16 and smaller, but I prefer up eye or straight eye to keep the hook gap open. Tie in tips of 3 to 5 barbs (the length of the hook shank) at rear of hook then wrap thread forward, wrap the barbs forward 2/3 the length of the hook shank. Then counter wrap the rib, try for 5 wraps (remember tradition). Stack deer hair then tie in about hook shank long (take a few trys to figure out how many fibers to get the proper width), you want it sparse but not too thin. Wrap in a small dubbed ball- shaped thorax then pull over wing case and tie down wing, then pull up wing, wrap enough thread to make wing spread wide then tie off.

Outing in Early November Coho—November 2

By early November, we should have a decent number of coho holding in the pools in the river, where stripping streamers could produce some exciting action. We will meet in the parking lot across the road from the Shady Cove boat ramp at 8:00 AM. For this outing, an eight-weight rod with a fast sinking line or shooting-head system would work well. To that, add a 10 to 15 lb leader and a bright streamer. Popular flies include Egg-sucking Leeches, Comets, Clouser Minnows, and rabbit-strip flies. Pink and purple are popular colors for coho flies, but chartreuse, orange, olive, and black patterns will also work well at times. Having a driftboat, raft, or pontoon boat will provide more access to good water; however, there are several areas that provide good access to the river for those without a boat. Since we will be on the river most of the day, bring food and water, waders, rain gear, polarized glasses, and your typical fishing accessories. You should also bring your steelhead equipment since we will pass through a lot of good steelhead water between the areas where we will fish for coho.


