Meet your new Conservation Committee Chair

My name is Rick Graw and I'm your new chair of the conservation committee. My goal is to stimulate your appreciation, interest and support for our fisheries. I am not an expert in fishery science but I am a scientist. I work for the Pacific Northwest region of the US Forest Service. My expertise is in atmospheric sciences, a topic which rivals fisheries in its complexities. I primarily work on trying to increase the amount of prescribed burning on the federal forests to reduce the risk of wildfires and improve forest health, while minimizing the smoke impacts to communities. A challenging task for sure. During wildfire season, I forecast and monitor smoke , alert communities, and help them understand how best to protect themselves from the smoke. I also work on assessing the adverse effects of air pollution on our national forest, particularly the wilderness areas . This requires understanding how air pollution interacts with the forest and the visitors, conducting studies to monitor the condition and trends, perform modeling studies to understand the causes, and works with the agencies that issue permits to reduce air pollution emissions, if warranted.

I am relatively new the Rogue Valley. I've only been living here for the past three years. When I moved here my goal was to catch a steelhead on a fly. I'm glad to be able to report that I've achieved that accomplishment, first with the help of a guide, and then on my own. The Rogue River is a special place and one I have quickly grown to love and appreciate. I've also been able to fish a number of the lakes in southwest Oregon. We are so fortunate to have so many wonderful places to fish. Its from this love and appreciation of these special places that I want to help protect and ensure our children and grandchildren will be able to enjoy as much as we do.

My intention is to write a column for each monthly newsletter on a conservation topic related to our fisheries. There's so many interesting topics: hatchery versus native fish, dam removal and other restoration efforts, jet boats, water quantity and quality, and so much more. I may share a relevant publication to stimulate your interest or sometimes offer an opinion. I understand some of the these topics can be controversial but I don't want to shy away from important topics. Many of you have so much experience and expertise about our fisheries. I want to learn from you and help others do the same. Whether you are an expert or not, I would like to know what you'd like to hear about. You can email me, call me, or just come talk to me at one of our meetings. Even better, let's go fishing together and talk about what's on your mind. I look forward to learning and engaging with you.

In the mean time, I would like to leave you with this simple challenge. When you visit one of our local lakes or rivers, would you please leave it in better condition than you found it? Let's be good stewards of our fisheries and pick up after ourselves and others. You never know who may be watching. It may just inspire others to do the same.

Garret Lesco Fly fishing the jetty

Oregon is covered in jetties that allow us to use the numerous estuaries along the Oregon coast. These jetties are a perfect habitat for fish that readily eat a fly. Garret will break down how to tackle these man made habitats and catch fish from the rocks. He will get into the gear, safety, fish, flies, and much more in his presentation on the fly fishing the jetty. You never know what you might catch out on the rocks.

Financial Report – Tim Bolling

We are still waiting to finalize the results of the auction as of the time this is being written, but preliminary results show an approximate net in excess of \$ 11500. That means we will add at least \$ 8050.00 to our grant fund, which is used in response to requests from organizations such as Rogue River Watershed Council, WaterWatch, Oregon Stewardship, Casting for Recovery, and Project Healing Waters. All of those, incidentally, had representatives or presentations in their programs at the auction. In addition, there were letters from some the past recipients of the scholarships we fund at OSU.

We had to guarantee our caterer a minimum of 100 dinners and we ended up with a total of 107 reservations. Unfortunately, 9 of those people did not show for the auction but of those, only 2 had not paid in advance. The other 7 people graciously indicated that we were to accept their dinner payments as a donation.

Auction report

The results are in for the Rogue Flyfisher's 2024 auction. We pretty much matched the efforts and financial results of the 2022 event led by Tim Bolling. In particular the Bucket raffle of 48 items yielded \$1, 390; the Silent auction of 59 items grossed \$4,437 and the Live auction with 25 items took in \$8,900. Just about dead on to the 2022 results.

Not to forget, the auction really began last April at the club meeting when Tim put out the emergency call and I put up my hand. Next month we had a dozen or so members sign up to help and slowly but surely we were off to the races. Others joined in too. Because of the personal contacts made by a handful of volunteers the bucket raffle took in about 45 items from businesses that made up most of the 48 buckets. The Silent auction had about 15 items from businesses and 41 from donations. Special credit is given to John Bjorkholm who parted with a huge amount of his inventory including rods/reel/packs/ and about 40 boxes of flies. Thank you John very much. For the Live auction 13 members donated trips and 12 businesses and/or individuals donated other items. And three of our members tied flies for the bucket and silent auction. Tim Bolling listed all those who contributed by name or business and posted that list as you entered the big tent.

What made the event a success of course is because just over 100 of you did paid up and showed up for the excellent dinner and opportunity to go home with lots of good stuff. You made it happen. And I especially thank Tim Bolling who introduced me to spread sheets and held my hand throughout.

No guarantees in life and if the club is to remain alive and well it will be because enough of you out there do something and get involved in a small/medium or big way.
