President's Message from David Haight

It was great to resume meetings in September after our summer break. It was fun to see everyone, find out about their summer adventures, and hear about their fishing trips. Thank you to Scott Wright of River Design Group who filled in as our speaker, at the last minute, when Jim McCarthy of Water Watch had to cancel due to illness. Scott's impromptu discussions about the issues with Winchester Dam on the North Umpqua River, the planned removal of Pomeroy Dam on the Illinois River, and other topics were very interesting and educational.

There are a lot of benefits to being a member of the Rogue Flyfishes. In addition to the camaraderie and educational programs at the monthly dinner meetings, the club offers outings, classes, picnics, opportunities to acquire new gear, and a place to make new friends



and fishing partners. All of these can be very helpful in advancing your skills in and enjoyment of fly fishing.

The Rogue Flyfishers also does a lot of work to protect and enhance the fishery resources we so value, and promote the sport of fly fishing. We do this in a variety of ways: We advocate for policies that are beneficial to our sport and fishery resources. We provide volunteer labor for habitat enhancement projects and fish population inventories. We supply instructors for environmental education classes and for classes that teach skill related to fly fishing. We also provide funds to support fish restoration projects and environmental education.

As a club, everything we do is dependent upon the members to volunteer their time and talents. We do not have a paid staff or anyone that is obligated to carry out these things for us. In past years, the members of the Rogue Flyfishers were much more engaged in these activities. We built fish ladders around dams, planted riparian vegetation, assisted with school programs, offered classes to the community, and testified at public meetings. While we do have some members who still engage in these important activities and some members who work hard on the basic tasks necessary to keep the club operating, the percentage of the club members who do so is not what it used to be.

The Rogue Flyfishers really needs additional people to help with the running of the club and to help fulfill our mission. We have two board members retiring from the Board of Directors at the end of this year and need two people to take their place. The Board of Directors makes decisions on behalf of the club and conducts much of the essential business of the club. We also need someone to take on the job of Program Chair. This person arranges for the speakers for our dinner meetings. Since some meetings have other activities, this involves only seven speakers per year. Since Steve Day has arranged for speakers up until our summer break and I am arranging a speaker for October, there are only three speakers left to obtain for 2024. This is a job that gives you the opportunity to visit with some of the big names in fly fishing, and should be fun.

Our Action Chair recently stepped down, due primarily to work obligations. As the previous Auction Chair, Tim Bolling is guiding the Board Members in an effort to put on the auction as scheduled next May. As the club's Treasurer, Tim is already doing more than his fair share for the club, and it is not reasonable to expect him to be responsible for the auction as well. Tim has divided preparation for the auction into categories, and we are looking for members who will be in charge of each category, as well as people to help with various tasks. Having a successful auction is essential to the operation of the club, and it allows us to support important environmental and educational programs.

This is your club, and it will be as successful and as beneficial as you want it to be. We can't expect just a few members to do all the work associated with the club. With enough members participating, we can make light work for everyone, and we can have a successful club that meets the needs of our members and makes a meaningful contribution to the environment and the sport of Fly fishing.

AUCTION HELP NEEDED!

Due to a change in requirements in her work, Tammy Dedrick has had to resign as Auction Chair. As the past Auction Chair, I am willing to help as much as I can with preparing for and putting on the next auction, but with my duties as treasurer and personal reasons, it is not possible for me to take sole responsibility for the next auction. 

Diamond Lake Wooly Bugger

We all have numerous wooly bugger patterns, but this is one I did not have until enlightened by our digital guru, Steve Ostrander. He said that Diamond Lake resort claims to have originated the pattern, but, regardless, it works well on other Cascade lakes as well. It certainly worked one day last summer at Rocky Point! I don't know why, but there seems to be something magic about burnt orange marabou tails.

Materials:

Hook - #8 nymph. Daiichi 1530 (2XH, 1XS) or Mustad 3906. But any similar hook will do.
Thread - black
Tail – burnt orange marabou, about 1½ shank length, with a couple strips of Krystal Flash or Flashabou atop
Rib – small Ultra Wire
Abdomen – medium olive chenille
Hackle – grizzly saddle. Cree would probably work as

well.

Pinch down the hook barb, place the hook in the vise and tie a thread base back to the bend.

Select a burnt orange marabou feather, hopefully one with fluffy barbules all the way to the tip. Pull or cut off about 10 or 12 barbules and tie them on to be 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 times the length of the hook shank. Add a couple thin strips of pearl Krystal Flash.

Tie in a 2-3" piece of Ultra Wire (any color) at the tail but don't wrap yet. Let it hang. It will be used to counter wrap over the hackle after it is wrapped back to the tail.

For the abdomen tie on a piece of chenille long enough to wrap to the eye area and wrap it up almost to the eye. Tie down, leaving enough room for the head.

Select a grizzly hackle with barbs about as long as the hook gape. Find the sweet spot near the base of the feather shaft where it flexes freely when bent and tie it on near the eye. Let the thread hang. Using your hackle pliers, palmer the hackle feather back to the tail in about 4 wraps. Keep the tension on and when you get to the tail, wrap the wire over the tip end of the hackle to secure it. Two wraps are okay but one should hold it in place. Continue wrapping the wire over the hackle up to the eye area and tie down.

Build up a head, whip finish and coat with head cement.

The October outing on the Rogue has been changed from October 11th To October 17th.

Dear Rogue STEP Volunteers,

I'm writing to thank you for playing such a huge role in my last 8 years as the Salmon Trout Enhancement Program Biologist on the Rogue; this was truly one of the most enjoyable chapters of my career to date. What made my job truly special has been the relationships and friendships that I've made during that same time. We've accomplished a lot for the Rogue and the fish that we all love and pursue. I've learned a lot from you, and I hope that you've learned at least a few things from me. I think we've all had a lot of fun in the process. Back in 2007 when I got my first fisheries job on the Rogue as a seasonal technician hardly able to back a boat trailer, I could never have imagined after stints in other parts of Oregon and Northern California, that I would have landed back in SW Oregon and had the privilege to be working on this river and with its fish in 2023!

It's bittersweet to be writing you to let you know that I've decided to take another position with ODF&W. I can assure you that this decision was not taken lightly. Over the next few weeks, I will begin transitioning to my new job as the Rogue District Wildlife Habitat Biologist. I will be focusing on projects that protect and enhance wildlife habitat, improving public hunting access and opportunities on private lands in the SW region (Coos, Curry, Douglas, Josephine, and Jackson Counties), leading the SW regional Access & Habitat program and citizen council, and assisting with other district wildlife tasks like wildlife surveys, hunter R3 efforts, managing budgets and contractors, writing grants, and giving land-use recommendations that benefits wildlife and their habitat. I don't know how long I'll be serving on the "&W" side of the ODF&W equation, but it is my hope that it will help me diversify my skillset and broaden my future career prospects. Trust me, I still love fish! I'll be working with private landowners, counties, cities, federal and tribal partners, and even volunteers periodically to help accomplish a lot of these wildlife goals, so some of you may get a call!

The Salmon and Trout Enhancement Program (STEP) was started in 1981 and it will continue to get citizens engaged in fisheries management, monitoring, habitat improvement, education and outreach in Oregon and in the Rogue Watershed. There's 11 STEP biologists in the state and since it's inception thousands of volunteers have contributed hundreds of thousands of hours of their time to these goals and projects. I think it's one of the best programs in the Department, but I'm pretty biased. Its biggest asset is all of you that have helped to acclimate smolt and watched those adult fish return as adults (and hopefully catch the fruits of your labor), helped net broodstock, logged your summer steelhead catches, tagged trout in the Holy Water, rose your collective voices when a stream was in need of protection, rescued baby steelhead out of a drying stream, planted and watered riparian trees, helped a little boy get excited about raising a baby salmon in his classroom, or rebaited the hook of that little girl so she could catch her first trout! Dedicated volunteers are what make it all happen. Dedicated volunteers are what helped me do all of that, and helped me have fun every day that I got to go to work as the STEP Biologist. Volunteers and citizen participation is really what STEP is all about. You make it happen! I hope that you won't be a stranger, and I hope that you'll continue to be involved in our region's fisheries monitoring, habitat enhancement, and education.

I'll still be at the Rogue District Watershed Office here in Central Point, one desk over. My email will stay the same. I'll just be wearing a slightly different hat, and not giving them out as much as I used to! Please, stay in touch.
